Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Doolittle are much better now after having a very bad case of flu.

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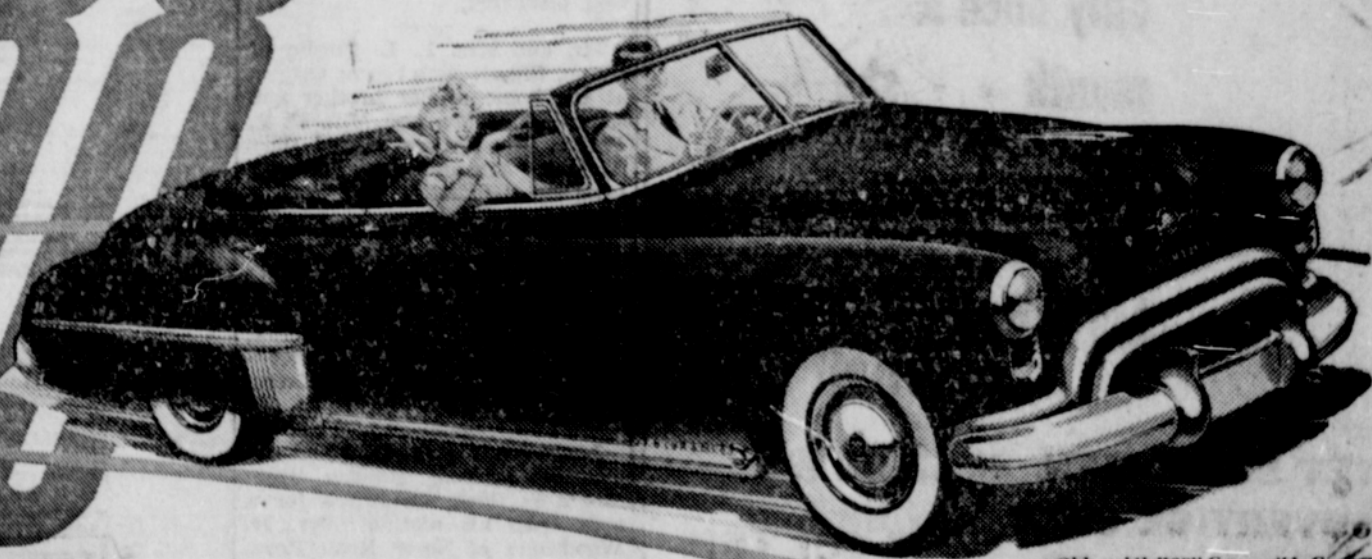
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
