RECORD NUMBER OF DP'S DUE TO SETTLE IN U. S.

GENEVA—A record number of 16,580 refugees and displaced persons from Europe are sailing from Bremerhaven, Germany, for the United States during August, the U. N. International Refugee Organization announced here.

Traveling in 16 IRO-chartered transports, the refugees are due to land in Boston, New Orleans and New York. The record August sailings will exceed by more than 5,000 passengers the total of 11,547 transported in 13 IRO-chartered U. S. Army Transports in the month of July.

This acceleration in the monthly shipping totals conforms with plans made by IRO to insure the arrival of the 205,000 displaced persons who have been authorized to enter the United States by June 30, 1950.

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South Lane Road Crew Speeds Work On London Road

The south Lane road crews have shown some speed in the rebuilding of the South 6th or Blackbutte highway and yesterday had applied the first oiling coating and rock to better than a mile of roadway from the south city limit to the Mary White Bridge. John Trunell, south Lane county supervisor said yesterday that the crew would rebuild the road from the south city limit to the London store, if the rock held out. The crew first applied an oil coating and then a coating of rock, to a width of 20 feet. Ditches on the South 6th road are also being cleaned and

widened. A finishing coat of oil and rock will be applied to this road.

Other improvements made recently include a new 20 foot bridge over Mosby Creek, replacing the old Brumbaugh bridge, widening parts of the Row River highway as well as ditches along this road and widening and improving the ditches of the Lorane road to the Silk Creek community.

County commissioners have previously stated that more base will be added to both the Lorane highway and Row River highway as soon as the rains set in. The court, however, said that the two latter roads would not be oiled until next summer.

A new 24 foot bridge is being completed near the Jim Spahr place on the new road around the south rim of the Dorena lake.

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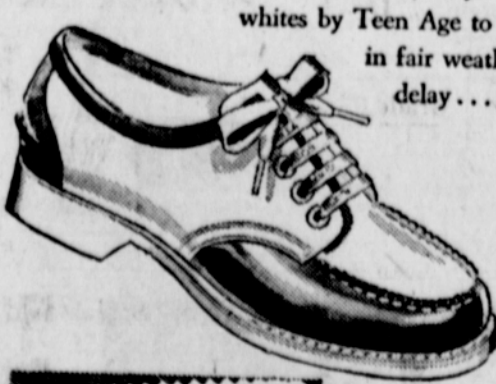
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
