The Lynx Hollow school No. 80 will open September 12 instead of the 6th as previously announced.

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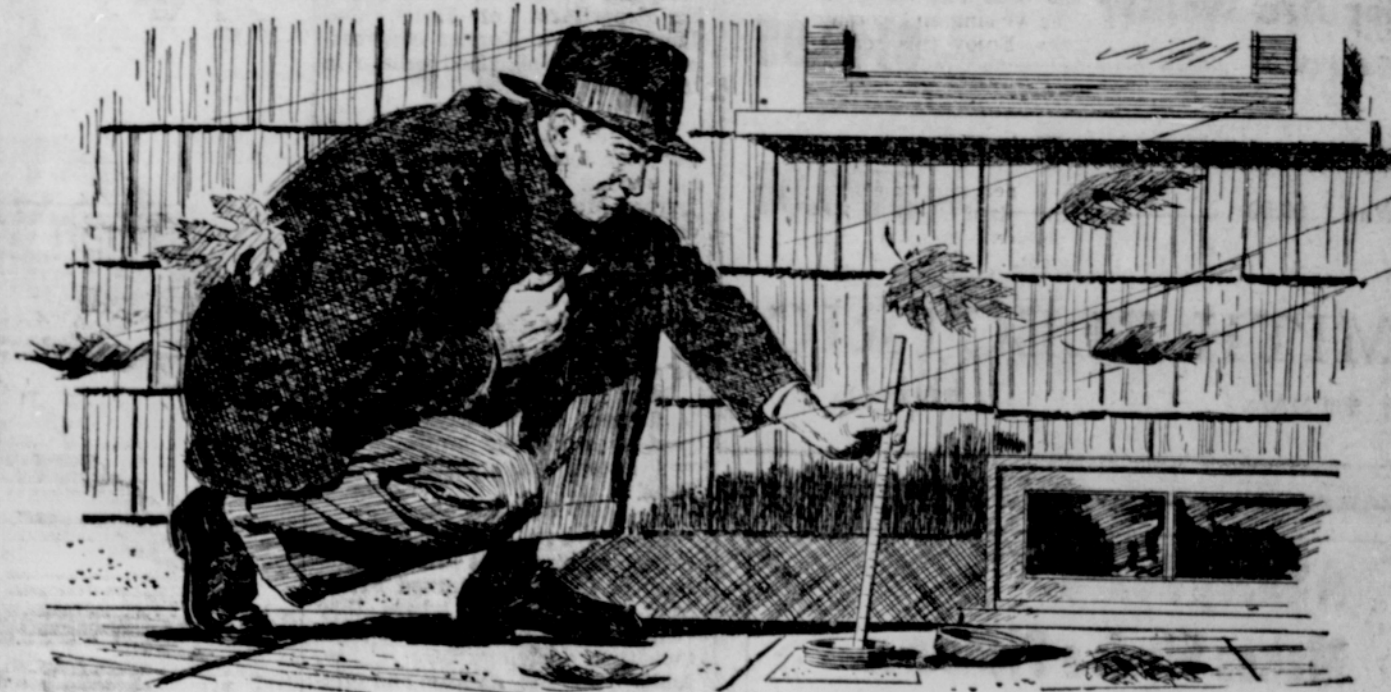
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
