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Beavers in Shape For Opener With UCLA Sept. 16

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 7—Kip Taylor's rugged program of two three-hour workouts each day has already started to pay off handsome dividends for the 1949 Oregon State football squad.

Midway through the second week of practice the Beavers are not only rounding into top physical condition but the club is rapidly smoothing out its execution of plays. Taylor himself is the first to admit the Beavers are coming along well and should be ready for UCLA in the conference opener at Los Angeles September 16.

Most noticeable improvement has been in blocking. Taylor and his assistants have spent hours teaching the Orangemen to block hard and sure and the results already are clearly evident.

The few spectators who get past the closed practice gates with special passes issued by Taylor are greatly impressed by the tremendous spirit of the Orange players. Competition is keen at all positions and the starting lineups for the opening encounter are still far from settled.

If Taylor had to name his lineup today, it probably would look something like this: left end, John Thomas; left tackle, Arvid Niemi; left guard, Ed Carmichael; center, Al Gray; right guard, Captain Tom DeSylvia; right tackle, Jay Simon; right end, Rudy Ruppe; quarterback, Ralph Carr; left half, Ken Carpenter; right half, Don Mast; and fullback, Dick Twenge. Thomas and Carr are sophomores; Al Gray and Niemi, juniors; and the rest are seniors. But most of these men are being pushed hard and will have to battle to maintain their top position.

Antelope Hunters Mail in Reports

Approximately 50 per cent of the hunters who were issued tags for the recent antelope season in Oregon have mailed in their report cards. To date 488 reports have been received. Of these 44 did not hunt, 85 did not make a kill, and 359 reported kills.

Of the kills so far reported, 202 were made in Lake county, 102 in Harney county, 51 in Malheur county, and 4 failed to report the location of the kill. Of those reporting no kill, 49 hunted in Lake county, 29 in Harney county, and 7 in Malheur county.

Robert Mace, chief of big game for the Commission, urges all other antelope hunters to send in their reports as soon as possible. He stressed the fact that tag holders are to report whether they hunted or not and whether they made a kill or not. He also stated that he wished to thank the antelope hunters for the fine sportsmanship, generally shown in the field.

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No Special Deer Season in State

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon state game director, stated today that a general misunderstanding seems to exist regarding the deer season in the Tillamook Burn area of Tillamook county. Many requests for information regarding a special season in this area have been received at the commission offices. There are no special seasons for deer scheduled to be held anywhere in Oregon this year, Lockwood stated. Undoubtedly, the misunderstanding has arisen from the fact that there will be a portion of the Tillamook Burn open for archery hunting this year. There will be three areas in the state open for archers. A portion of the Canyon Creek Refuge will be open for hunters using long bows and broadhead arrows from September 17 to October 20. The Mt. Emily Refuge in Union and Umatilla counties and a portion of the Tillamook Burn will be open to hunters using long bow and broadhead arrows from September 17 to September 28.

The area in the Tillamook Burn section of Tillamook County open for archery is described as follows: Beginning at the junction of the Jordan Creek Road with the Wilson River Highway No. 6, thence up the Jordan Creek Road to the summit, thence north along the South Fork of the Wilson River Road to the old McNamara Camp on the Wilson River Highway No. 6, thence southwesterly along the Wilson River Highway No. 6 to the Jordan Creek Road, the point of beginning.

Archery permits to hunt in these areas may be had free of charge, by sending the hunter's name, address, and hunting license number to the offices of the Oregon State Game Commission in Portland.
