Driver Training Classes Are Again Being Offered at Union High School

Driver training classes are again being held at the Cottage Grove union high school. They are open to students who are fifteen years or older, and who do not drive, or have drivers licenses.

The course consists of classroom instruction in the driving and operation of an automobile and also some of the mechanics of cars. Each student will complete approximately eight hours of behind the wheel driving before completing the course, and in so doing will earn a driver's license. Starting, stopping, parking and some of the more difficult features of driving will be practiced.

Experience checks have borne out the fact that, driving properly learned in driver training classes, has produced good, safe drivers in our schools.

The driver training car this year is a new 1949 Ford V8 four-door sedan, completely equipped with overdrive, heater, radio and other extras. It is being furnished free of charge by the Floyd Githens Motor Company, Inc. The district's only expense is maintenance and insurance.

The class will be taught by Francis Trusty, who has completed a state course for teachers of driver training.

Making of Wood Stave Silo to Be Demonstrated 15th

A demonstration on how to construct a wood stave silo will be held September 15 at the L. J. Bryson farm in the Lancaster community north of Junction City. A 2x6 tongue and grooved silo will be constructed under the supervision of M. G. Huber, extension agricultural engineer of Oregon State college, and W. B. Parker, county extension agent.

The silo being erected next Thursday will be built according to plans obtainable at the county extension agent's office. Many of these silos are now being used in Oregon with excellent results.

Everyone interested in a silage program or building a silo is invited to attend.
