TROUT EGGS TO BE TAKEN AT PAULINA LAKE

C. A. Lockwood, State Game Director, Monday dispatched a crew of fishery biologists and aids to begin clean-up activities at the outlet end of Paulina Lake. Starting around the last of September, the men will remove all weeds, brush, drift wood, and accumulated debris that will in any way interfere with the forthcoming egg-taking operations.

Resident biologists will determine the proper time, usually in late October or early November, when the fish are ready to spawn. At this time, the fish are netted, the eggs are stripped, fertilized, and the fish returned unharmed to the lake again. The eggs thus obtained are placed in hatcheries where they develop into fingerlings or legal size trout and are then available for distribution to lakes and streams throughout the state.

Kelly Field to Be Scene of Lion-Tide Battle Sept. 30th

The Lions will meet the University High Golden Tide at Kelly field Friday night at 8:00 p.m. Top spot in the Willamette League will hinge on the results of this game as both teams are undefeated to date in two league encounters.

Jim Webb looked particularly impressive with his swivel-hipped running as did Hayes with his power running and Ron Hite with his speed around the ends.

The Tiders will be a big challenge to the two year undefeated record of the Lions. Coach Ray Hendrickson will bring to town a line-up with nine lettermen in the starting team. Last year the Tiders held the Lions to a 7-7 tie to keep them from state championship contention.

Lions Dump Huskies By 33-0 Count

(By Bob Hunter) The mighty Lions knocked over the Sweet Home Huskies by a 33-0 count on Kelly Field last Friday night.

The team displayed a fine running and passing attack as they rolled up 5 touchdowns and 3 conversions.

Ron Hite was the big gun of the evening as he racked up 102 yards and one touchdown.

Sweet Home kicked off to the Lions and the Grovers marched the ball back to the Sweet Home 14 yard line only to lose the ball on a pass interception.

The Huskies punted and Jim Webb returned the ball to the Husky 33 on the return.

Hayes went off his own left tackle for 13 yards and Webb hit the center for 13 yards and Webb went off his left tackle to advance the ball to the 9.

A clipping penalty put the ball back on the 17 but Ron Hite took the ball around his own right end to the Sweet Home 4.

Hayes went through the center of the line for the first score and Webb hit Hayes with a short pass for the conversion.

The Lions exchanged punts and fumbles all through the second and part of the third quarter.

The Grove grid machine started to move after taking over on downs on their own 32. On the second play Webb went around his own left end for the full 68 yards only to have it brought back to the Husky 35 for a clipping penalty.

Three plays put the ball on the 27 and Ron Hite galloped over for the second Grove T.D. Sonny Hayes went down the middle for the conversion to make it 14-0.

An exchange of punts gave the Lions the ball on the Sweet Home 30.

A couple of line plays and one end run put the ball on the Husky 5 and Hayes went through right tackle to make it 20-0. The try for point was no good.

In the fourth quarter the Sweet Homers punted to the Lions and Webb ran it back to the Sweet Home 21.

Hayes and Webb combined efforts to get on the Husky 11. The Grovers took to the air lanes as Webb shot an 11 yard jump pass to Bob Cook in the end zone. The Lions again failed to convert and the score stayed at 26-0.

With only minutes remaining in the final stanza Webb hit Cook with a pass that was good for 29 yards. This was followed up by a bullet pass to lanky Larry Wolfard in the end zone. Duane Rad-

loff hit the middle of the line for the conversion making the final score Cottage Grove 33, Sweet Home 0.

Sweet Home threatened only once, when Don Klum reeled off 40 yards to the Grove 22. It looked like Klum was gone, but Hayes nailed him from behind.

Lockwood Pleads For Safe Deer Hunting Season

With the opening of deer hunting season in Oregon on October 1, close to 200,000 hunters will go afield. It is fine that so many will avail themselves of the opportunity to enjoy this fine recreation, however, the very numbers who will hunt place a heavy responsibility on each hunter. This is a responsibility that is manifold and one that must be assumed by all.

That each hunter must observe the game laws is obvious if these resources are to be maintained in the face of pyramiding pressure. Another responsibility, not quite so obvious, is that each hunter going afield is also responsible for maintaining the habitat in which game animals live. Fire must be in our minds constantly. How easy it is for just one small thoughtless act to destroy thousands of acres of deer food. One campfire left untended can destroy a whole watershed which, in turn, means not only loss of valuable timber but means loss of trout streams and loss of life-giving top soil as well. One cigarette stub flipped away can mean hundreds of starving deer.

Let's be extra cautious this year, whether we hunt in the forest or in the desert ranges, for fire means loss to all.

Our responsibility, however, does not stop here, for each hunter is carrying in his hands the greatest responsibility of all—the lives of our fellow men. Better that we never get our buck than to destroy a human life. During the hunting season in Oregon last year six people lost their lives from gunfire. Six people such as you and your loved ones were killed as the result of human carelessness. We all know that one fatality, even one accident, is just one too many. We must keep this in mind. We must handle our firearms with the greatest of care and never shoot until we are absolutely certain.

We ask your aid. We ask you to observe the game laws. We ask you to be careful with fire and above all we ask you to use your firearms with the greatest of care.

GENERAL TROUT SEASON CLOSES SEPTEMBER 30

At the close of this season, the winter regulations will go into effect. Ducks to Travel South to Meet UCLA Squad 30th

University of Oregon, Eugene, September 28 (Special)—Oregon's high-flying Webfoots, fresh from a 41 to 0 thumping of Idaho, travel south this week end to meet an equally rampant UCLA football team.

The Ducks, by defeating Idaho, have now stretched their conference victory streak to 13 straight games, the best league record since 1933. The last conference eleven to upset Oregon was the UCLA Bruins, the very squad blocking the Webfoots' path this week end. That was the conference opener for Coach Jim Aiken, back in 1947—since then the Ducks have rolled over every league opponent.

The approaching battle will be a Friday night affair under the lights of the Los Angeles Coliseum, capable of seating 103,000 fans. It will be the second night game for Oregon this year—in their season opener against St. Mary's, under lights, the Ducks showed no indication of night blindness, winning 24 to 7.

UCLA has exhibited plenty of scoring punch in its first two games this season, rolling over Oregon State, and then punching Iowa, 41 to 25. Bruin Coach Red Sanders switched his charges to the single wing this season, and the move has proved successful so far.

Oregon suffered a serious loss in the Idaho game when right end Les Hagen, a pass-receiver, broke his leg. Art Milne, a 175-pounder

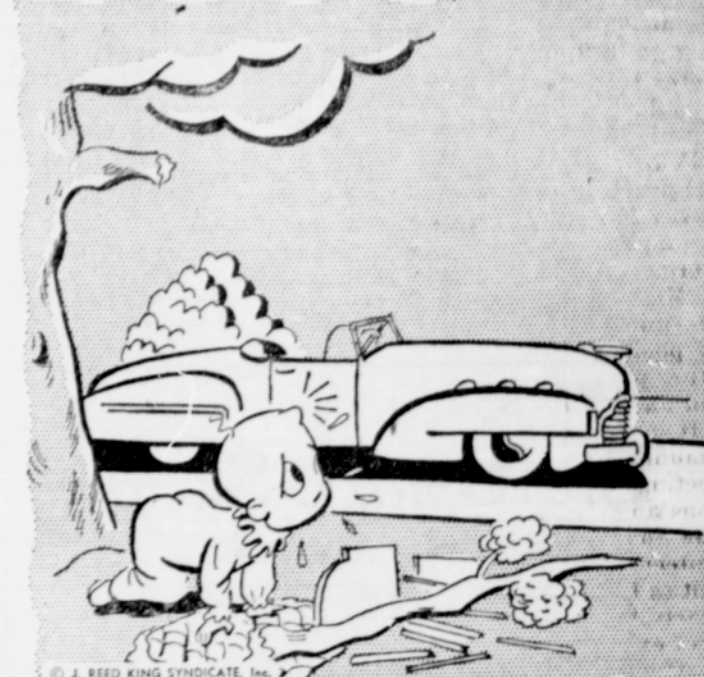

reserve wingman, has been switched over to the right side to replace Hagen.

The battle between Earl Stelle and Jim Calderwood for the starting quarterback position on the Duck team still continues. Stelle drew the starting nod in the St. Mary's game, and again Saturday

against Idaho, but Calderwood, a former Baker high flash, completed four passes out of seven attempts, for 108 yards, in his brief Saturday appearance. Stelle managed to hit three out of six, for 49 yards. Calderwood also handled all the Oregon punting.
