

Lane Co. Farmers To Receive Wheat Allotments Soon

A number of Lane County farmers will soon be receiving revised 1950 wheat acreage allotments based on a recently passed amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938. Although designed primarily to make the adjustment less severe in areas where wheat acreage has been expanded in recent years, the amendment also affects the allotments on many other farms in other areas, Ernest E. Schriek, Chairman of the Lane County ACA Committee, points out.

"The new amendment does not decrease any farm allotments already established," the chairman explains. "Its effect is to determine acreage allotment for each farm. If the new minimum is less than the original allotment, no revision will be made. Revised allotment notices are being mailed only to those affected."

In general, the amendment provides for a minimum 1950 farm acreage allotment based on 50 per cent of the larger of (1) the 1949 wheat acreage plus the land in fallow in 1949 on which wheat was seeded for harvest in 1948, or (2) the 1948 wheat acreage plus the land in fallow in 1948 on which wheat was seeded for harvest in 1947. This "base" is multiplied by a factor of 92.319 per cent to obtain the minimum 1950 allotment. This factor represents the ratio between the 1950 national acreage allotment and the national average wheat seedings during the 10 calendar years 1939-1948, adjusted as required by the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938.

For those farms where an established rotation of alternate wheat and summer fallow was taken into account in determining the 1950 acreage allotment, the minimum 1950 allotment will not be greater than 92.319 per cent of the acreage of land summer fallow in 1949 under such a rotation practice for seeding to wheat for harvest in 1950, the chairman states.

Pacific Exposition Offers \$140,000 Contestant Prizes

Portland, Oregon, September 26, (Special)—The largest total of cash awards ever offered in its 39 years—\$140,000—has been posted by the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in North Portland for this year's show, October 7-15.

The money will go to land products, livestock, horse show and rodeo contestants.

Top cash will be the \$60,926 distributed in livestock classes. Another \$8,000 will go to 4-H boys and girls and \$4,000 to FFA.

Rodeo hands will compete for \$11,350 and an equal amount of purses in their 13 performances. Horse show awards will total \$22,000 with entry money added. Addition of Palomino, Quarter Horse and Arabian stakes has boosted the total.

Cutting horses, appearing for the first time at the Pacific International in an event that has been thrilling rodeo throngs will have \$2,700 posted in addition to entry money.

Another \$10,000 will be distributed to land products exhibits and \$1750 to intercollegiate judging.

Mail orders for the livestock show and all 13 performances of the rodeo-horse show are being received at the livestock arena, P. O. Box 96, North Portland, Ore.

SENIOR CLASS HUGE AT OSC

Oregon State College—The largest senior class in the history of O.S.C. was assured early in this fall's registration when at the end of the first day 1472 seniors had enrolled, which was 200 more than the number of seniors at the close of fall term last year. Total enrollment will not be known until later, though the freshman class has proved larger than expected. With the falling off of veteran students a reduction of around 10 per cent has been estimated.
