## Grass and Legume Mixture Favored For Cover Crops

A cover crop including a cereal and a legume seeded together will provide more green material than either seeded alone and will have added insurance against crop failure, states Arthur S. King, O.S.C. soil conservation specialist, who adds that winter cover crops are a necessary part of good soil management.

The grain in the mixture provides the most dependable cover. Legumes are sometimes killed by extreme weather, pests or disease, the specialist points out.

To qualify as a "good" cover crop, however, the mixture must make an early fall growth to provide a cover during cold winter weather and produce a heavy tonnage of green material to be plowed under early in the spring.

Clean-cultivated orchards, commercial vegetable land, hopyards, and berry plantings are all examples of lands that will profit by the protection afforded by a growing cover crop during the late fall, winter and early spring months. Cover crops are a source of organic matter and will prevent fertility losses through leaching.

On soils with low fertility and where legumes have been unsuccessful, King recommends use of Abruzzi rye as a cover crop. In addition to a heavy seeding, he suggests use of fall and spring applications of nitrogen fertilizer.

Where possible it is also recommended that a drill be used to insure a thick, even cover crop stand. Added cover in orchards will be provided if the tree rows are drilled both ways. The specialist also urges "across slope" drilling to prevent soil erosion.

Rough, cloddy soil surfaces will aid water penetration and reduce erosion until the crop has a chance to become established. Soil that has been left rough in the fall will be much easier to work next spring as compared with soil that is worked down to a packed, fine mulch.

## Douglas Fir Is More in Demand

PORTLAND, ORE., Oct. 13.—Unfilled order files for lumber mounted and gross stocks at Douglas fir sawmills of western Washington and Oregon declined as mills for the sixth straight week took more business than production, according to H. E. Smith, secretary, West Coast Lumbermen's Association. Orders have exceeded output for nine of the last twelve weeks.

Fir producers accepted 18 million feet a week more business during September than production, Smith pointed out. Even in the face of a serious freight car shortage in Southern Oregon, mills shipped 15 million feet a week more lumber than they cut during September.

By September's end gross stocks at mills had shrunk to 929,038,000 board feet, lowest in 12 months. The lumber executive stated, "Stocks dropped 38 million feet in September from August totals and the unfilled order file stood at 584,574,000 board feet, up some 12 million feet over August."

Both orders and shipments were well above production for the first 29 weeks of 1949, Smith stated. He said the demand for West Coast lumber was credited to some extent to the nationwide promotion campaign financed by the industry to acquaint buyers and users with the proper grade of lumber for each job.

The weekly average of West Coast lumber production in September was 170,076,000 b. f. or 113.7% of the 1943-1948 average. Orders averaged 188,956,000 b. f.; shipments 183,196,000 b. f. Weekly averages for August were: Production 167,260,000 (111.8% of the 1943-1948 average). Orders 182,709,000 b. f.; shipments 162,927,000 b. f.

Thirty-nine weeks of 1949 cumulative production 6,998,252,000 b. f.; thirty-nine weeks of 1948, 6,643,848,000 b. f.; thirty-nine weeks of 1947, 6,449,817,000.

Orders for thirty-nine weeks of 1949 breakdown as follows: Rail 3,994,287,000 b. f.; truck 295,303,000 b. f.; domestic cargo 1,089,918,000 b. f.; export 260,562,000 b. f.; local 701,302,000.

The industry's unfilled order file stood at 584,574,000 b. f. at the end of September. Gross stocks at 929,038,000.

**INDIA GETS \$10 MILLION TO IMPROVE AGRICULTURE**  
 WASHINGTON—A \$10,000,000 loan to India—the second loan granted to that country within eight weeks—was announced here by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, one of the Specialized Agencies affiliated with the United Nations.

Parts of the loan will be used to finance part of the cost of agricultural machinery needed by India for the reclamation of lands infested with a weed known as kans grass; the rest for the clearing of jungle lands, bank officials said. It is expected that this will help to increase production of grain and thus reduce the food deficit which constitutes one of the most pressing problems facing India today.

The loan is for a term of seven years and carries interest at the rate of 2½ per cent, plus commission at the rate of 1 per cent. Amortization payments, calculated to retire the loan at maturity will start on 1 June 1952.

The Bank on 18 August 1949 had made another loan of 34 million for the reconstruction and development of India's railways.

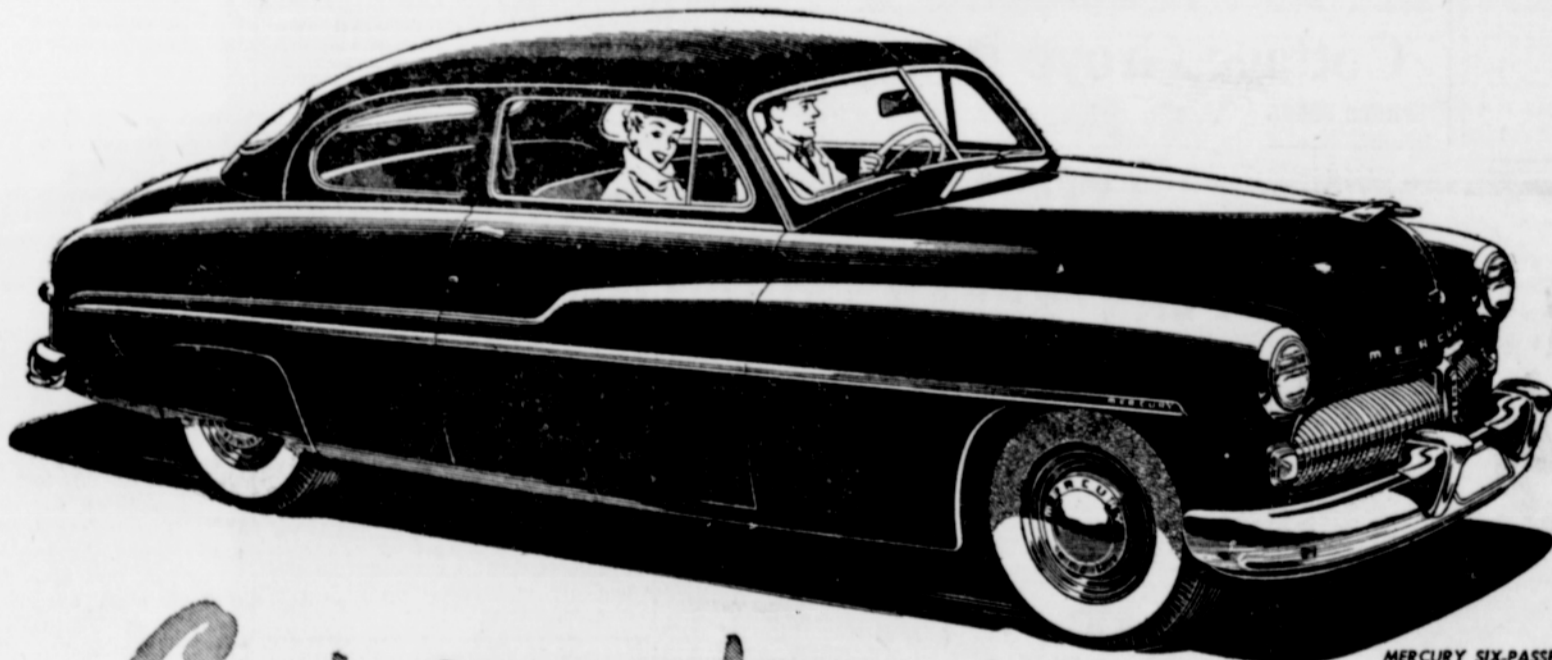
