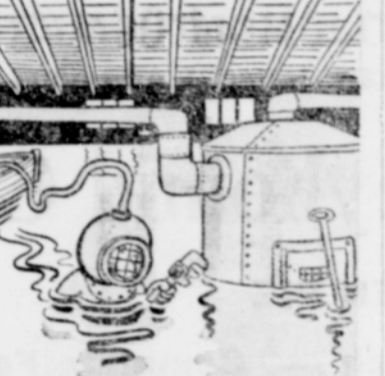

O. & C. to Offer Twenty Parcels of Timber Nov. 7, 8, 9

Twenty parcels of O. & C. timber and 8 parcels of Public Domain timber carrying a volume of 51,334 M board feet of timber and 5,050 lineal feet of Western Red Cedar Poles, with an appraised value of \$393,067.00 will be offered for sale on November 7, 8 and 9, 1949 by the Bureau of Land Management, Region I, it was announced Monday by Daniel L. Goldy, Regional Administrator at Portland.

Twelve of these parcels will be offered for sale by sealed bid on November 8, 1949 at the Regional Administrator's office in Portland. These tracts carry a volume of 12,033 M board feet and a value of \$94,161.00.

The remaining parcels will be offered for sale at oral auction as follows:

November 7, 1949, 5 at Roseburg carrying a volume of 14,690 M board feet with an appraised value of \$96,827.75.

November 8, 1949, 4 at Eugene carrying a volume of 8,290 M board feet with an appraised value of \$64,801.25.

November 9, 1949, 7 at Salem carrying a volume of 16,295 M board feet with an appraised value of \$137,277.00.

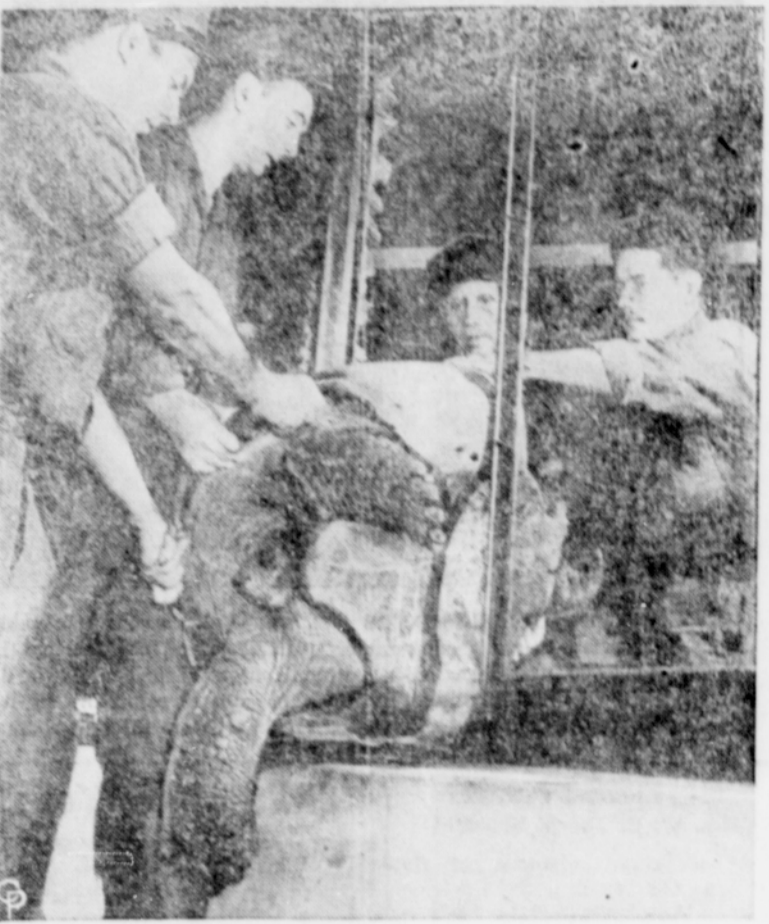

Hampshire Sow Sets New Production Mark

Ringold Lady Dora, 733,056, with the litter with which she established a new production record for the Hampshire breed. This sow is the first to have made a "Six Star" record in the Hampshire registry. She is five years old and has raised 75 pigs in eight litters. In her six star litters she has raised 62 pigs, an



average of 10.3. These pigs weighed a total of 410 pounds, 56 days after farrowing. She is owned by William C. Goodheart Jr., Eaton, Ohio. She was fed corn, oats, alfalfa and pelleted milk by-products prior to farrowing. Her pigs were raised on a ration of seven parts corn and three parts oats with 8 per cent milk by-products added.

'Voice of Prophecy' Broadcast at Cost of \$885,000

Radio time can cost a lot of money. One of the biggest religious programs in the world, possibly the largest in number of stations employed, is a legitimate broadcast emanating from Glendale, California, the North American headquarters of "The Voice of Prophecy." The Voice is Dr. H. M. S. Richards whose words were carried last year to 85 per cent of the potential listeners in the United States and Canada at a cost for radio time alone of \$885,000.

"The Voice of Prophecy" goes out on 687 stations all over the world, of which 445 are on the North American continent. This program is now being heard every Sunday on two American networks, the Mutual Broadcasting System and the American Broadcasting Company. Locally, the program may be heard from KORE in Eugene and from the Mutual and ABC stations in Portland. It is also being broadcast over the most powerful radio outlets in the world, such as Radio Luxembourg's 200,000 watt station which covers all Europe and Western Asia, and Monte Carlo's 125,000 watt station benefiting all southern Europe.

Those who cannot hear may read The Voice of Prophecy Bible correspondence courses which are now translated into more than twenty languages and dialects, among them English, Spanish, Portuguese, French, German, Italian, Dutch, Danish, Norwegian, Swedish, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Malay, Atabic and Russian. Bible lessons are also available in Braille for the blind. Over forty thousand active Voice of Prophecy students are right now enrolled in the Los Angeles office alone.

Since the Voice of Prophecy never makes a direct appeal for contributions, finances would seem to be a problem. But two-thirds of the cost is volunteered by radio listeners who send in unsolicited small contributions, often no more than a dollar. The remainder is made up by the Seventh-day Adventists who sponsor the program. On October 8, 1949 all the Seventh-day Adventist churches in North America, including the local Cottage Grove church, devoted their church offering for the day to the Voice of Prophecy.

2, 4-D Spray Proves Fatal To Some Woody Plants

Many woody plants, including willows, are partially killed by 2, 4-D spray. Killing of large shrubs or trees cannot be expected. The spray may be used, however, to prevent resprouting of susceptible species by applying as a concentrated spray to resprouts after the trees and shrubs have been cut. Repeated applications will be necessary to prevent further growth.

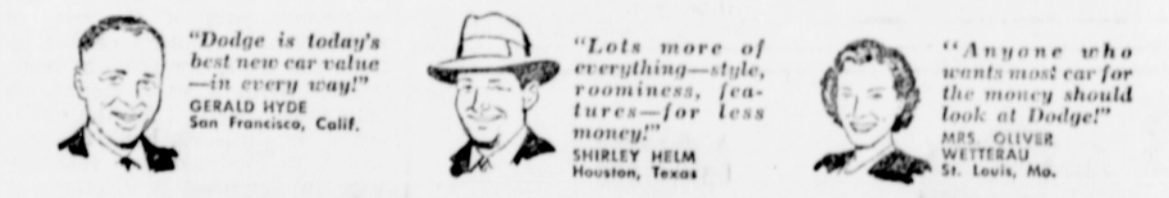
