Beavers to Meet Montana Oct. 15 At Bell Field

Oregon State College, Corvallis, October 10—With their first conference victory behind them—a stirring 7-3 upset win over Washington at Seattle last Saturday—Oregon State's Beavers are preparing for their home opener against the best University of Montana club in years on Bell field Saturday afternoon.

Sharing the spotlight with the game will be the first annual Band day at Oregon State, high school bands from Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon and Sweet Home along with the Beavers' snappy 75-piece band will parade through Corvallis at noon Saturday and then furnish the half-time entertainment.

The Beavers and Grizzlies will be meeting on the gridiron for the first time since 1942 when the Orange rolled to an easy 33-0 triumph. In eleven contests between the two schools since 1925, Oregon State has won nine with two games ending in deadlocks.

But Coach Kip Taylor and his Orangemen are expecting a rugged battle from the Missouri clan. Under their new mentor, former Stanford great Ted Shipkey, the Grizzlies almost upset highly touted Washington State a couple of weeks ago. The Cougars had to come from behind in the last four minutes to eke out a 13-7 decision.

Montana's T-formation attack is directed by Johnny Helling and Tom Kingsford, a pair of nifty passers. For a target they have sticky fingered Ray Bauer, who pulled in 19 aerials last season to rank fourth in the conference as a receiver. Shipkey also has a couple of hard running backs in Jack O'Loughlin and Roy Malcolm.

Oregon State showed a complete reversal of form in whipping the Huskies and Beaver fans feel the club has found itself. After throwing back everything the Huskies had to offer in the first half, the Beavers finally gave up a field goal in the third quarter and then roared back to march 40 yards in six plays for the game winning touchdown in the fourth period.

Ken Carpenter, OSC's top candidate for all-American honors, had another great day against Washington. He rolled up 72 yards on running plays, completed two out of five passes for 25 yards, rammed over for the touchdown and posted a 40.9 punting average. Sophomore Gene Morrow, starting his first game at quarterback, also turned in a fine performance. In the line Captain Tom DeSylvia, rugged right guard; and Stan McGuire, veteran right end, stood out. The Beavers came through the hard struggle without a serious injury.

Lions Plagued by Injuries, Meet 2nd Defeat of Season

The Eugene Axemen handed the Lions their second straight defeat of the year by a 27-0 count at Civic stadium in Eugene, Friday night.

The Lions, sparked by Ray Boggs and Jim Webb, held the home town boys to only seven points in the first half, made by fanning Barber midway in the first canto.

The Lions sorely missed Ron Fite and Sonny Hayes in the backfield, and Bob Cook on the line.

On the first two plays the Lions threw the Axemen for two losses. Russell tossed a pass to Manning Barber who went down to the 18. The Axemen got down to the 5 for another first down.

Two plays later the Lions tried a pass but it was intercepted by Ted Hodges on the 22. The Eugene boys drove down to the 15 where Russell passed to Merritt Barber in the end zone. Barber caught the ball, dropped it, and Webb grabbed it before it hit the ground and in it out to the 2.

The Lions then put on their first drive of the game, going all the way to the Axemen 45. There the lions lost the ball on downs.

The Axemen then put on a drive but paid off — with the first D. of the game.

After this all the way up to the half, the undermanned Lion squad held on with nothing but guts and determination. In the second half, he injury riddled Lion squad was to match for the Axemen depth and experience as the home town ads rolled up three touchdowns and two conversions all made by the Barbers.

Besides the injuries on the Lion squad before the game, Red Engert was out for about a quarter, and Ray Boggs was out from midway in the second canto to late in the fourth quarter.

The Lions had an edge on first downs at the end of the first half and at the end of the game the Axemen had a 13-12 edge.

Quail Hearing Set for Oct. 14th

C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Director, announced today that the Game Commission will hold a public hearing at its Portland office October 14, to determine whether the bag limit on valley quail should be raised from 10 per day and not more than 15 during the entire season to 8 quail a day and not more than 24 during the entire season. The hearing will also consider whether Klamath County and that part of Lake County lying west of U. S. Highway 395 and north of Valley Falls should be added to the open area for valley quail hunting during the regular season.

At the time that the hunting regulations were set in July, very few valley quail broods had hatched, although brood stock numbers were down somewhat in certain areas, no measure of the current hatch was obtainable. Recent information indicates that valley quail have had a highly successful nesting season, and in spite of winter losses, the current crop in central Oregon counties is above normal.

SEVEN HUNTERS BRING BACK SEVEN DEER

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Grey Whales to Be Visible Along Coast Late Fall

Salem, Oregon, October 10 (Special)—In late fall, the Pacific ocean offers an added attraction for visitors along the Oregon coast when the grey whales pass by heading toward southern waters. They are easily observed from U. S. Highway 101 on the average of three-quarters of a mile from shore.

Pair by pair they swim leisurely southward, sometimes congregating for offshore rests, the sea becoming almost like a garden of geysers as they spout plumes of spray high into the air. As they play in the waves, the whales often rise so far above the surface their entire backs can be seen, and when they dive, they sometimes thrust huge forked tails ten feet into the air.

After passing by in a continuous procession for about two months, the whales finally disappear from the sea waters, only to reappear about a month later en route north. How far north and south they go, has never been determined.
