"EVANGELISM IN THE CHURCH" FILM SHOWN

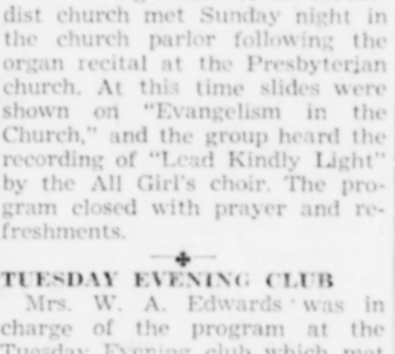

ATTEND CAPPING CEREMONY

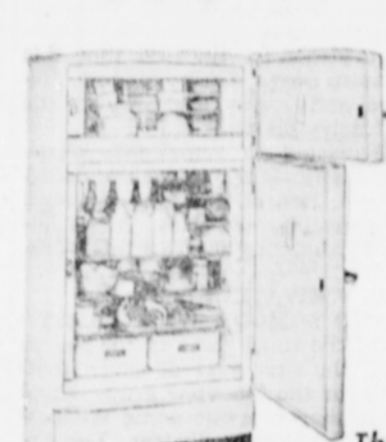

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TOO NUMEROUS TO MENTION

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Food Cooked in the Broiler

THERE are many foods that are fine for broiling. For instance, on a cool evening, serve a grilled bacon plate. Or a satisfying platter meal of pan-broiled tomatoes, bacon, little pork sausage and cornmeal mush squares.

Besides potatoes both sweet and just spuds, other foods fine for broiling are tomatoes, onions, mushrooms, canned asparagus, parboiled carrots, apple slices, oranges, grapefruit, bananas, peaches, pears and apricots. Other meats that broil well are lamb steaks and chops, franks, beef patties, bacon, sweetbreads, sliced ham, kidneys.

Good Combinations

Appealing combinations for broiled meals include: 1. Frankfurters split and stuffed with sauerkraut, broiled potato slices (first parboiled), sliced tomatoes. 2. Beef patties, and bacon, potato cakes, carrot slices (first parboiled), and the onion slices. 3. Ham slice, sweet potato slices brushed with butter, tomatoes. 4. Lamb patties, grapefruit slices, bunches of canned asparagus, parboiled parsnips. 5. Lamb or pork kidneys wrapped with bacon, tomato slices, Spanish rice. 6. Broiled tomatoes, broiled mushrooms, broiled ham steak. 7. Canned asparagus bunches, tomato quarters, broiled bananas, broiled lamb shoulder steaks. 8. Broiled pineapple slices, broiled onions on hamburger, bundles of canned green beans. 9. Grilled potato sticks, onion slices, parboiled carrot sticks and grilled calves liver. 10. Parboiled green pepper cases filled with cheese and rice, grilled tomatoes, Canadian bacon. 11. Sweetbreads, onion slices and peach halves.

If you broil the whole meal, you'll save on time and effort in preparation, cooking and dishwashing, besides serving something a little different, always appreciated by the family.

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
