

11 Year Old Boy Kills Bear in Comstock Area

Marshall Littlepage, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Littlepage of the Comstock community, shot and killed a 250-pound black bear Sunday about

two miles from his home.

Hunting deer with his father, the two separated, the boy to come up the canyon to head any deer in the brush up to where his father was waiting when he came to within 40 feet of the big bear.

"Mickie" never stopped to think what might have happened if he

had only wounded Mr. Bruin, and shot once with his 30-30. The bear was killed instantly the shot striking behind the ear.

The bear dressed out over 200 pounds of meat. The kill was made in the old Lovegren logging area which is about straight east of Shadybrook on Highway 99.

Beavers to Face Stanford Sat. 22

Oregon State College, Corvallis, October 18—Oregon State's fast improving football team, which broke the school's all-time scoring record in a conference game by whipping Montana, 43-14, here last Saturday, faces another tough California opponent this Saturday when the Beavers travel to Palo Alto to play Stanford.

The Indians walloped Washington 40-0, at Seattle last Saturday. Coach Kip Taylor's Beavers had to come from behind in the fourth quarter to edge the Huskies, 7-3, a week earlier. Stanford boasts a high-geared offensive paced by two of the best sophomore backs on the coast in quarterback Gary Kerkorian and halfback Harry Hugasian.

In the last meeting of the two clubs Oregon scored a 13-7 victory at Palo Alto in 1947. The two teams did not meet last year.

The Beavers displayed by far their best offensive of the season in rolling over the bewildered Grizzlies. General blocking and play execution were much improved. The Orange passing attack was by far the most effective to date with 11 completions out of 19 attempts good for 175 yards.

Although he played less than half the game, Ken Carpenter, Oregon State's all-American candidate, turned in another brilliant performance. He connected on three pass attempts for 40 yards, picked up 35 yards in seven running plays, and ran back a punt 37 yard for a touchdown.

Stan McGuire, ace right end and kicking specialist, set what is believed to be a new conference record when he successfully booted nine straight conversion attempts. He has now made 12 straight conversions and 14 out of 16 for the season to date.

The Beavers came through the Montana contest without serious injury and should be at full strength for Stanford. Taylor contemplates no drastic lineup changes this week.

Public Shooting Area Expected to Produce Ducks

Early reports from the field received by the Oregon State Game Commission tell of unusually heavy concentrations of early ducks and geese at the Chewaucan Public Shooting Area operated by the commission near Paisley, Oregon. Men familiar with the area state that conditions look better than they have for the past ten years, and hunters should enjoy reasonable success during the first half of the waterfowl season. Success during the second half will depend greatly on weather conditions.

Good reports have also been received from the Summer Lake Public Shooting Area which is well known to many Oregon hunters. In addition to these areas the Game Commission will operate a Public Shooting Area on Sauvie Island, near Portland, and in co-operation with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service a Public Shooting Area will be operated on a portion of the Malheur Refuge near Burns, Oregon.

Bag Limit Increased to 8

After holding a poorly attended public hearing on October 14, the Oregon State Game Commission increased the bag limit on valley quail for the current season to 8 quail a day and not more than 24 during the entire season. In addition, the Commission opened Klamath County and that portion of Lake County lying west of U. S. 395 and north of Valley Falls to valley quail during the regular quail season.

Open season is from noon, October 21 through October 30, inclusive, in Josephine, Jackson, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Grant, Klamath, and that portion of Jefferson County outside of the Madras Irrigation Project and that portion of Lake County lying west of U. S. 395 and north of Valley Falls. The bag limit is 8 valley quail a day and not more than 24 during the entire season.

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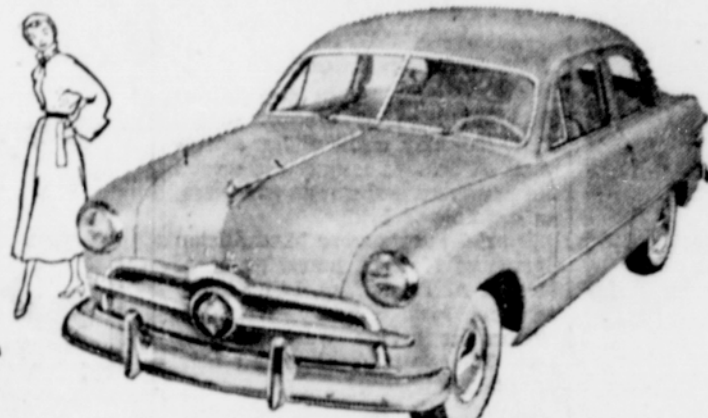
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
