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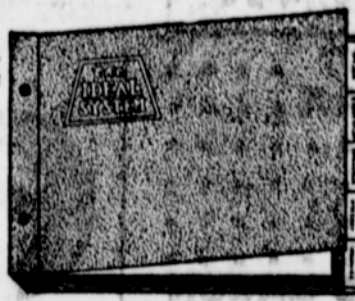

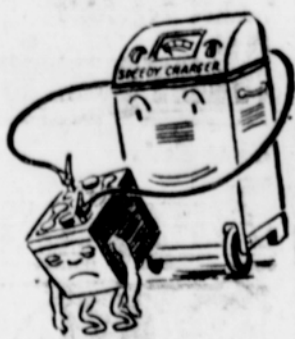

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Ducks to Invade Iowa Oct. 29th

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 25 (Special)—Oregon's gridiron Ducks invade the heart of the Midwest Saturday to battle the University of Iowa Hawkeyes, at Iowa City.

Iowa, coached by Dr. Eddie Anderson, in his eighth season as Hawkeye mentor, has had an up-and-down season this year, after finishing in a three-way tie for fourth in the Big Ten conference last year. The Hawkeyes dropped their opener to UCLA, who edged Oregon the next week, defeated Purdue, was dropped by Illinois, and whacked Indiana, 35 to 9. Saturday they played Northwestern.

Iowa is the second Big Ten team the Webfoots have scheduled in two seasons. Last year Oregon played Michigan, for its first meeting with a member of the always-strong Western Conference.

Despite the defeated status of both teams a large crowd is expected to pour into the 53,000 seating capacity Iowa stadium, because Saturday is Dad's Day on the Iowa campus. The University itself has a student body of 10,000.

Spark of the Iowa attack is Quarterback Glenn Drahn, relatively unheralded as a passer before the season started. Drahn, a 175-pound junior, has about a 700 percentage in completing passes, and is gunning for a new Iowa yardage record. In four games he has gained 405 yards through the air.

Other Hawkeyes rank high in Big Ten statistics, too. Bob McKenzie, right end, is the conference's leading pass receiver. Halfback Jack Dittmer, tied for first in scoring, and Duane Brandt, first in pass interceptions.

Oregon's Coach Jim Aiken will fly his team to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, today by chartered airliner, where they will stay until game time Saturday. A bus will carry the squad to Iowa City and the stadium then.

Behind the passing and quarterbacking of Earl Stelle, and the running attack generated by Fullback Bob Sanders, Halts Woodley Lewis, John McKay and George Bell, the Ducks will enter the game on about even terms with the Hawkeyes.

OREGON GAME COMMISSION TO PROPAGATE LAKE TROUT

The Oregon State Game Commission at their October meeting placed their approval on a plan to secure lake trout eggs for hatching and eventual liberation into Odell lake.

The Five year program calls for the hatching of 100,000 annually of these lake trout, or mackinaw, as they are often called. These fish will be liberated when approximately six inches in length.

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Big Lava Lake Dam Is Built Near Bend Lately

The fishway construction crest of the Oregon State Game Commission has recently finished construction of a low dam and grill in the outlet of Big Lava lake near Bend. Big Lava lake was the scene of recent trash fish control work carried on by the Commission. The lake is connected by an intermittent stream with Little Lava lake which still has a population of trash fish. To keep these trash fish from migrating back into Big Lava lake during the spring runoff, this low dam with a grill has been constructed.

An installation of the same type was also constructed in the outlet of Little Cultus lake. All of the fish in both of these lakes were recently killed in trash fish control work. The lakes will lie idle until fish food is once again established, and then they will be stocked with trout. Past experience has shown that excellent results can be expected from this type of program, but every guard must be made to keep trash fish from becoming reintroduced.

The Oregon State Game Commission fishways crew working in cooperation with the Oregon State Fish Commission has also been working on a greatly improved fishway in Lincoln county. Large steps have been blasted out of the rock, and concrete retaining walls are being constructed. This work is expected to reach completion about November the first.
