Lebanon Warriors Eked Out 7-6 Win Over Lions Friday

The Lebanon High Warriors barely eked out a win over the Cottage Grove Lions by a 7-6 count on Kelly Friday night. Lebanon won the toss and elected to receive. After two plays the Warriors quick kicked from their own 15 to the Grove 35, where it was first and ten. It continued this way throughout the first quarter and part of the second.

Then Kirkie, the big Lebanon fullback, took a direct pass from center and went wide around his own left end and down the sideline for 65 yards and a touchdown. Whitmore's kick for point was good to make it 7-0 for the Warriors.

The remainder of the half and the third quarter were played on even terms, with neither team getting inside the other's 20-yard line. Then midway in the fourth quarter the Lions unleashed a vi-

cious passing attack that caught the Warriors by surprise. Webb shot a screen pass to Boggs on the 30 and he ran it to the 35 for a first down.

Webb passed again to Bob Gasper on the 50 where he was downed by a host of Lebanon tacklers. Another Webb pass went down to Buddy McBee on the 25, and he made it to the 15 before being downed. Boggs crashed the line to the 5, but a holding penalty nullified the gain and put the ball back on the 30. Webb shot a pass to Gasper on the 10 and he made it to the two. And Ray Boggs crashed the line for the first and only Grove touchdown in the game.

Lebanon got nowhere when they got the ball, and punted out to the Grove 35.

Again the home town lads unleashed their passing attack, being stopped at the Lebanon 35.

Lebanon took over and the game ended with the Warriors in possession of the ball.

Commission Crew Takes 300,000 Eastern Brook Eggs at East Lake

Fall egg-taking operations of the Game Commission got under way last week with 300,000 eastern brook eggs being taken at East Lake. In that there are no areas for natural spawning in the lake, crews annually take eggs from the trout in this lake for the various hatcheries. Paulina Lake and Elk Lake are also scheduled for egg taking this fall.

Brood fish that are held at the hatcheries supply the greatest portion of the eggs hatched each year, but with the proposed expanded hatchery program the Game Commission is procuring eggs from all available sources. In fact, some three million eggs will be purchased from private sources.

Increased pond space at nearly all of the Game Commission's fifteen trout hatcheries has made it possible to rear a substantially increased number of trout this coming year.

Trout Liberations Completed for Season by Pack

The string of pack mules used by the Oregon State Game Commission to stock the remote lakes of the state finished up the season's work late in October. Operation has been continued since the last week in June. During the season a total of 434,000 eastern brook trout and 440,000 rainbow trout had been stocked in Cascade lakes which are not reached by road. Several headwater streams also received plantings. The fish varied in size from two to three inches in length.

Since much of the work has been taken over by the airplane, the pack string concentrated on the more isolated lakes. Forty-five lakes not previously planted were stocked for the first time. The trout were supplied from the Klamath, Fall River, and Wizard Falls Hatcheries of the Game Commission. The area covered roughly ranged from the headwaters of Rogue River to the Mt. Jefferson country.

Greater numbers of fishermen were observed in the wilderness areas this year than in any time in the past. The fishing success varied with the weather and the locality, but from most interviews, it seemed that anglers had had excellent results in most lakes. The largest fish checked by Game Commission personnel in the wilderness areas was a rainbow weighing 5½ pounds and measuring 26 inches in length. The fine rainbow was taken in the Taylor Burn area.

Jefferson Cubs Lose to Springfield

PORTLAND—A salmon run decline in Yaquina, Alsea and Siuslaw rivers prompted the State Fish commission Tuesday to order closure of the commercial season November 4.

Master fish warden Arnie Suomela said the action would reduce the catch below the previous announced poundage quotas. The closure date announced in August was Nov. 20.

Suomela said the closure would be for all species although it was aimed at assuring escapement of silver salmon to the spawning grounds.
