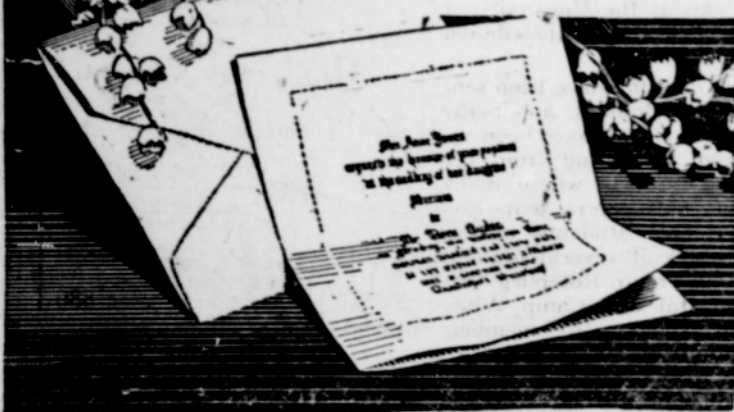
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Miss Ermina Smith Announces Betrothal

Interest Little Daughter In Cooking With Candy Recipes

AS many a mother has discovered through the years, one of the best methods of introducing a little girl to the kitchen is by letting her assist in the making of candy. Then, helping to clean up afterwards is part of the fun. And of course it is up to the chief cook to prepare candy that is real dreamboat stuff, and not have it "sugar" or lack smoothness.

Fruit Fudge

To make a new fruit fudge, use a large saucepan and cook 3 c. granulated sugar, 1/2 tsp. salt, one c. whole milk and 1/2 c. glycerine over a low fire, stirring constantly until mixture boils. Wipe down the sides of the pan with a cloth-wrapped fork dipped in hot water. Stir occasionally to see that it is not sticking. Remove from stove when soft ball stage is reached (236 F.). Drop in 2 tsp. butter. Cool to lukewarm (110 F.) without stirring. Add 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla. Beat until creamy. Add 1/2 c. chopped nuts and 1/4 c. quartered red or green cherries rubbed with 1/2 tsp. glycerine; pour quickly into greased pan. Cut in squares when cool. Unless a utensil with a heavy bottom is used, this has to be watched for sticking. Also when beating watch when glass begins to go as it sets so quickly, you have to pour it out rapidly (or not beat quite so much).

Coconut Surprises will delight the small fry, too, both cooking and consuming. Combine one c. granulated sugar, 1/2 c. water, 4 tsp. glycerine and 1/2 tsp. salt. Cook to 240 F. Add red coloring to the desired amount, add 2 tsp. butter; cook to 242 F. Remove from stove, add 1/2 tsp. almond extract, and when mixture stops bubbling, dip 1/4 lb. marshmallows one at a time. Roll coated marshmallows in lightly-browned coconut (or white coconut) or chopped nuts.

To prepare the marshmallows—and this is a task small girls especially will enjoy—brush off sugar, cut 1/2-inch slit with sharp knife (this operation to be performed by the head cook). Then press in whole or half candied cherry or nut meat. Allow to stand in air to dry for an hour or two before dipping in the coating mixture.
