Millers Nose Out Lions 9-7; Pass to Bob Cook Nullified

The Cottage Grove Lions lost their third "close one" of the season and their second straight to the Springfield Millers 9-7.

Last week the Lions were barely nosed out by Lebanon Warriors 7-6.

Springfield won the toss and elected to receive.

After making a first down on their own 30, Ken Erickson quick kicked to the Lion 45 after two line plays failed.

Jim Webb recovered his own fumble on the Lion 45 and then the Lions started to roll.

Webb packed the mail around the end and through the line to get down to the Miller 10 yard line.

Webb then hit Bob Cook with a pass in the end zone, but the score was nullified for a lineman was in motion.

One line play and one end run lost 4 yards, so Webb tried the same pass play but it was knocked down by John Kitajchuk.

The remainder of the half was played on even terms with neither team making any serious threat.

To start the second half the Millers kicked to the Lions. It was received by Boggs on the 25 who ran it up to the 31.

One series of plays put the ball on about the 30 where the Lions tried a fake kick, but it failed.

Springfield quick kicked on the third down to the Lion 30 where McBee ran it back to the 50 yard line.

Webb then hit Cook with a pass on the 30 yard line where he broke

away from a would-be tackler and romped to a TeeDee.

Webb ran the ball around his own left end for the conversion.

After the kick Springfield ran and passed the ball down to the two yard line where the Lions held for the downs.

Webb tried to run the ball out but was hit behind the goal line for a safety making the score 7-2 for the Lions.

The Lions free kicked from their own 20 and Reynolds received it on the 50 and returned it to the Lion 45.

A line crash by Ken Erickson was no good so Carl Boer heaved a pass to Kitajchuk who was all alone on the Lion 30. He made it down to the 15 before he was downed by a host of tacklers.

Jenkins and Erickson packed the mail for the Millers as they got their first TeeDee of the game. Jenkins converted through the line.

Cottage Grove tried desperately to get another score but could get to only the Miller 40 yard line before the final gun.

Beavers to Meet Michigan State in Portland Nov. 12

Oregon State College, Corvallis, November 8. A natural of naturalisms in Portland Saturday when Oregon state's football team entertains Coach Kip Taylor's old school, Michigan State, in an inter-sectional battle that holds more than the usual interest.

Taylor, who came to Oregon State last spring to take over the head coaching post, will match wits with his old boss, Biggie Munn. Michigan State, which was ranked 10th in the nation last week, has lost only two starts this fall, a hard-fought 7-3 decision to Michigan and a 34-21 thriller to mighty Notre Dame last weekend.

This game also will be the rubber contest in the series between the two state colleges. In three previous meetings each club has won once and one game ended in a 7-7 tie. Corvallis fans are still talking about last year's downy-brook which the Spartans won by a 46-21 count.

Two of the stars of last year's battle will duel against each other again this year. They are Lynn Chandnois of MSC and Ken Carpenter of the Orange. Both have performed brilliantly this fall and are top candidates for all-American honors.

Oregon State will pin its hopes of an upset victory on its terrific offensive which in the last four games has accounted for 136 points, a neat 34 point per contest average. After spotting a fired-up Idaho team two quick touchdowns at Moscow last Saturday, the over-confident Beavers snapped out of their lethargy to score five TD's in the last three quarters. In so doing they rolled up 263 yards on the ground and 131 in the air for a 414 total.

Carpenter had another fine day. He scored two touchdowns, one on a pass from Gene Morrow and another on a 13-yard sprint around end. He carried the ball 14 times for 94 yards to bring his total gain on the ground this fall to 586 yards.

Commission to Supply Multiflora Rose Plants To Sportsmen's Clubs

The Oregon State Game commission announces that a sufficient supply of multiflora rose is now available to permit a limited free distribution to organized sportsman's groups located in western Oregon. It is believed that most clubs have members who know the sites where the planting of this living fence would be of benefit to both the landowner and upland birds. If organizations are interested in establishing such a club-sponsored project, it is suggested that the group select planting sites with the cooperation of the landowner. After this is done, the club secretary should notify the game commission of its project and request the number of shrubs desired, from 500 to 1,000, along with the date, and place of delivery desired. Plantings of multiflora rose should be made in western Oregon from November first through the winter with the exception of freezing weather.

Beaver Bathe While Deer Dam

Many reports of wildlife damage are received and investigated by employees of the Oregon State Game commission, but two recent complaints from Grant county have the commission's district agent wondering. From the Ritter Hot Springs came a report that the beaver in the area were not only cutting fruit trees but were trailing down to the hot springs and taking baths in the hot water tube which had been constructed for human use. The same mail brought a complaint of the reported activities of deer damming up an irrigation ditch.

The district agent is wondering if this could be some cooperative agreement whereby the deer were taking over the normal work of the beaver while the latter took

100 Per Cent of Antelope Hunters Turn in Report

Robert Mace, chief of big game for the Oregon State Game Commission, announced Tuesday that one hundred per cent returns have been received from Oregon's antelope hunters. He reported that 929 of the 1,000 tag holders hunted, and of this number, 586 made a kill. Although only 169 of the group hunted in Malheur County, they had the highest success with 32 of them reporting kills and only 27 Malheur County hunters reporting no kills. Lake County was hunted the heaviest with 304 kills reported and 191 reporting no kills. The reports from those hunting Harney County showed 196 kills and 125 who were unsuccessful. Four of the successful hunters failed to report in which county they made their kill. This gave a total of 586 antelope killed and 343 hunters who were unsuccessful.

The heaviest kill was on opening day with 306 kills followed by 161 on the second day of the season. The success compares favorably with buck antelope seasons in the past and attests to the ability of the hunters in stalking this wary animal.

Results of the season show that it was favorably received by the hunters, and illegal losses were at a minimum. By limiting the kill to bucks, the Game Commission expects to perpetually maintain antelope hunting as a sport in Oregon. Mace also expressed the desire that deer hunters would send in their report cards as the information is vital to the proper management of Oregon's deer herds as well as antelope herds.

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At the date of this writing the Lions have a 2-4 record and will be out to upset the defending state champs. The Cave men will be favored however. —Lions Roar

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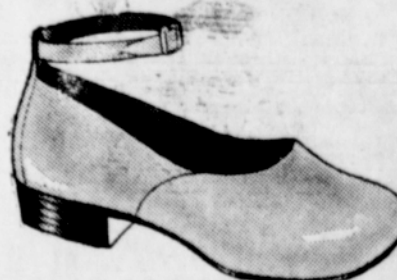
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
