A Favorite With Teen-Agers

AT one house we know a favorite dish with the sturdy high school youngsters is a Weenie Crown, which to them is far nicer than the more elegant crown roast.

Buy 1 1/2 lb. plump weenies; thread them crosswise on a string; then arrange like a crown, and tie. Fill center of crown with baked beans, then fasten 2 or 3 strips of bacon securely with toothpicks around the middle of the crown. Place in a 350 F. oven about 20 min. Remove carefully to a hot platter. Serve with carrot strips and red cabbage.

Pork Chops and Beans
For a pork chop and beans casserole, fry 6 pork chops until nicely browned on both sides. Pour one large can baked beans over chops, add tsp. sugar and 1/4 c. tomato cats-

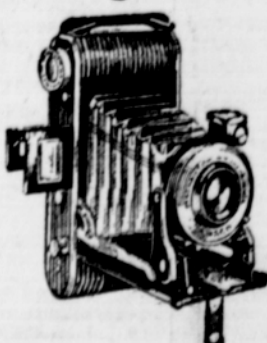
up; mix together lightly. Bake in 350 F. oven for about 20 min. Serve with brown bread and apple salad for a meal that is perfect now and right through the winter.

For a substantial sandwich quickly, heat 2 c. baked beans and one pork tongue chopped. Toast 8 slices bread on one side, then spread bean mixture on untoasted side. Heat under the broiler and serve hot with shredded lettuce. Serves 4.

For an excellent main dish for 6 that is most reasonable in cost, heat 3 tbsp. fat in skillet. Then add 1/4 c. sliced, peeled onions, one c. diced celery, 1/2 lb. ground beef; cook uncovered, about 10 min. Add 4 c. canned pork and beans, 1/2 c. Worcestershire sauce, tsp. salt, tsp. powdered sage and one c. water or canned tomato juice. Heat thoroughly. Serve with "grated carrot coleslaw."
