New 1950 Fords To Be on Display Tomorrow, 18th

The 1950 Ford line of passenger cars, with scores of improvements, was made public today by the Ford Division of Ford Motor Company.

"The progress that has been made in performance, economy, safety, comfort and appearance will again mark the 1950 Ford as the car of the year," according to L. D. Crusoe, vice-president and general manager, Ford Division.

The new Fords will be on display in the showrooms of 6,400 Ford dealers throughout the nation starting tomorrow (November 18).

All improvements in the 1950 Fords have been geared to offer even greater quality than was offered in the high quality 1949 Ford cars.

The new features embody improvements throughout the entire car—in the engine, the body, the seats, doors, frame, trunk, fabrics, instrument panel, brakes, floors and elsewhere.

The '50 Ford will be offered in two lines—the Custom Deluxe and the lower-priced Deluxe series. A full range of body styles will be available, including station wagons and convertibles. Ford will continue to offer the choice of two engines—the 100-horsepower V-8 and the 95-horsepower Six.

Styling of the 1950 car, although

not radically changed because of the wide public acceptance of the modern design of the Fords, nevertheless includes several distinctive features to enrich the appearance.

A colorful new crest, derived from an authentic coat of arms dating back to 17th century England, appears on the front of the hood and center of the trunk lid. This is the first crest that has ever appeared on Ford cars.

A chart to be displayed by the Githens Motors on the showing of the new Ford may be of interest to many people. It shows a map of the U. S. with the location of the 15 various products used in the manufacture of cars. For instance a total of 112,000,000 board feet of timber, supplied by the northwest is used in crating 1,000,000 Fords for shipment. Local products used in addition include 250,000 pounds of goats' hair in every 1,000,000 Fords produced, 3,200,000 pounds of wool and 93,000,000 pounds of beeswax.

5000 Are Expected At UO Homecoming

University of Oregon, Eugene, November 14 (Special) — More than 5000 alumni are expected to return to the University campus for the Homecoming celebration of November 18 and 19 when the keynote will be "Oregon-Then, Now, and Tomorrow".

Pointed up by the big game between the university and Oregon state college, the weekend will assume special significance because many alums will return to see a campus that has greatly expanded during the past year. Open for their observation will be three new buildings, the new Carson hall for women, remodeled Villard with the almost completed new wing Theatre, and the new unit of the Music building. Two other buildings under construction, the Erb Memorial Union and the Library wing, will be focal points of interest.

Registration for the big week end will open on Friday, Nov. 18, at 1 p.m., states Alumni Director Lester Anderson. This will take place at both the Osburn and Eugene hotels and on Saturday at the hotels and in Johnson hall on the campus.

Willard Dodds of Eugene is Homecoming chairman on the campus. Helping with arrangements for the alums is Robert Miller of Portland, Alumni association head.

Want a Tender Juicy Turkey? Try These Tips

Cook your Thanksgiving turkey by ear. If fat sputters or drippings burn, the oven is too hot.

That is a timely Thanksgiving cooking reminder from an O.S.C. extension nutrition specialist, Miss Agnes Kolshorn, who adds that long cooking in a comparatively low oven—300 to 325 degrees—will lend added flavor to the bird.

Cook the turkey in a shallow, uncovered pan without adding water, the specialist suggests. Place it on a rack breast down, and turn it from one side to the other on the hour. To finish cooking, turn the turkey breast up for the final 20 minutes or so. When the joints move easily under slight pressure, or a pinch of flesh feels soft, the bird is ready for carving.

A common turkey cooking error, the specialist points out, is cooking the fowl breast up. This method causes the juices to filter down out of the white meat causing this portion of the bird to become dry and without flavor.

Slow cooking gives more servings, juicier meat and more browning.

A turkey that weighs from 12 to 15 pounds when ready to stuff, for example, will roast in 5 or 6 hours in an oven at about 300 degrees Fahrenheit.

How much stuffing will you need? A common rule is one cup per pound of ready-to-roast turkey. Stuff loosely, because stuffing swells when cooked, and day old bread is best.

If a frozen turkey is purchased, start early to get it thawed. Add half again as long to the cooking time if the bird is started to cook while still frozen. It will take about two days to thaw a full sized turkey in a refrigerator or cooler, Miss Kolshorn points out. Before thawing, remove wrappings and cover loosely.

Children's Fund Outlines Program Planned for Asia

NEW YORK — India's rural areas will soon be visited by two United Nations-sponsored theaters on wheels, the U. N. International Children's Emergency Fund (UNICEF) announced here.

The project, in connection with a program which the Indian Government has undertaken, is one of the first approved under the UNICEF's extended program of aid to the needy children and expectant and nursing mothers of Asia.

The theaters will consist of motor vans, equipped with moving picture projectors, record players and public address systems, and will be used to spread factual information on child and maternal health care.

Other programs including training of child-care experts and health education for mothers and teachers have been approved for China, Indonesia, Japan, Pakistan, the Philippines, Thailand and the British territories of Hongkong, Brunei, Sarawak and Singapore. In the Philippines, for example, school lunches will be distributed in areas where malnutrition is the number one health problem.

Operations under way for India, Pakistan, Ceylon and South East Asia call for a UNICEF contribution of \$9,300,000 for supplies and training purposes. This sum forms part of an over-all budget of \$20,000,000, which embraces China, Japan and Korea, and which has been approved by the Fund for expenditure in the Far East and will be "matched" by contributions from the governments receiving help.

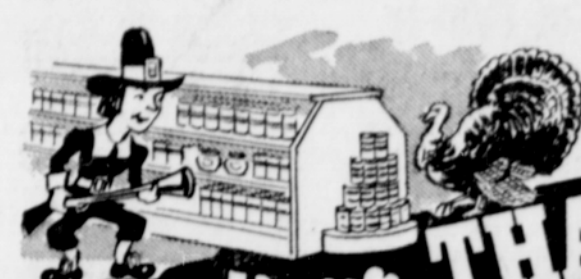
