Orange Winds Up Grid Season Win 20-10 Over Ore.

Oregon State College, Corvallis, November 21—Oregon State's football team, which climaxed a sensational stretch drive with a decisive 20-10 victory over Oregon at Eugene last Saturday, wound up the season with the best record by an Orange club since 1946.

The Beavers, under their new coach, dynamic Kip Taylor, defeated all five northern members of the conference to claim the mythical Northern Division championship and also posted impressive victories over two inter-sectional rivals, Utah and Michigan State. All three losses were due the California powerhouses—UC-LA, California, and Stanford.

Oregon State's showing is all the more amazing when it is recalled that the club, still in the throes of learning the intricate Michigan version of the single wing, dropped two of its first three starts and then won six of the next seven to wind up with seven victories against the trio of de- feats.

The highlight of the campaign probably was the stunning 25-20 upset triumph over eighth-ranked Michigan State, the school from which Taylor came to take over the coaching reins at Oregon State. The Beaver victory probably will be ranked as one of the biggest upsets of the season.

Taylor's colorful system gave Oregon State its highest scoring offense in the school's history. The Beavers racked up 232 points in 10 games for a neat 23.2 average. Only coast champion California prevented the Orange from scoring this fall.

Ken Carpenter, brilliant left halfback who spearheaded the Beaver attack all season, became the first Beaver back in history to make more than 1000 yards in total offense for one season. By collecting 78 against Oregon he brought his total up to 1003. He will go down in the books as one of OSC's all-time great backs.

Sharing the spotlight with Carpenter all season has been Stan McGuire, who, as a junior, is well on his way to becoming one of the Beavers' all-time great ends. He became the first Orange lineman in history to be named "Lineman of the Week" by the Associated Press for his spectacular exhibition against Michigan State. He was successful on 29 out of 33 conversion attempts this fall and booted a 32-yard field goal.

One of the most pleasing aspects of the season was the rapid improvement and all-round good play of one of the best crops of sophomores in the conference. Gene Morrow, the sophomore with the slingshot arm from The Dallas, was one of the best passers in the conference and an amazingly cool field general.

Bill Sheffield, speedy right half from Bend, looms as one of the best defensive backs ever to perform for the Orange. He intercepted nine passes during the season to rank near the top in the nation. Other sophs who came through in great shape were Don Zarosinski, guard from Klamath Falls; Pete Palmer, center from McMinnville; Herm and Jim Clark, tackle and guard brother combination from Honolulu; Cub Houck and Newt Schneider, quarterbacks from Salem and Seaside, respectively; Bill Farnham, tackle; Yale Rohlf and Don Nibblett, ends; Wes Hogland, guard; and Jack Hoxie, left half.

However, there will be some big gaps left by the graduation of 15 seniors. Included in this group are Rudy Ruppe, Bud Gibbs, and Craig McMicken, ends; Jay Simon and Jim Inglesby, tackles; Capt. Tom DeSylvia and Ed Carmichael, guards; Jim Clement, center; and Carpenter, Dick Gray, Dick Twenge, Don Mast, Andy Knudsen, Dick Villancour, and Duane Moore, backs.

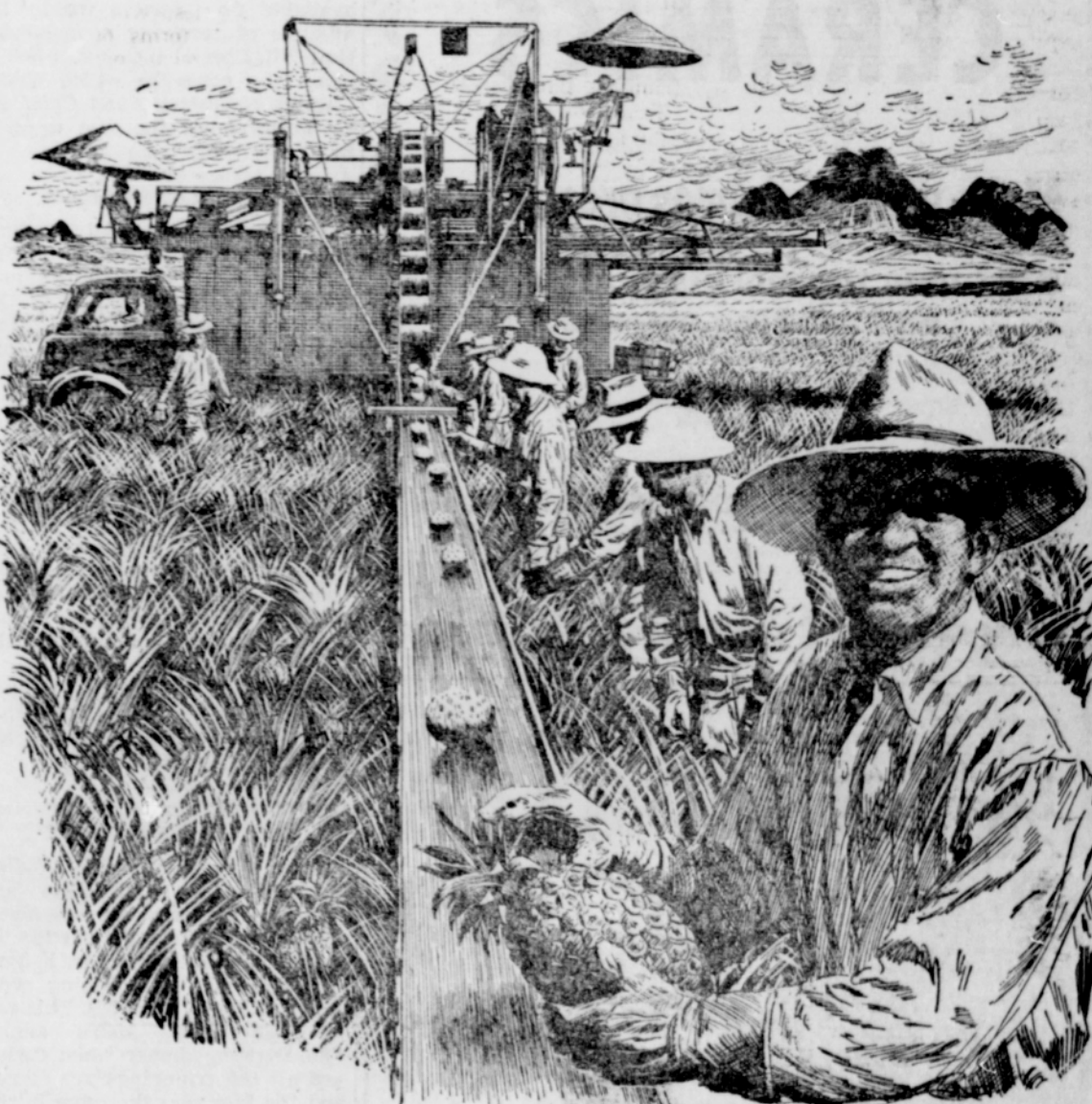
