Pastor Walter Blehm Reports on Autumn Council in St. Louis

A call for a sanctified ministry and the relentless preaching of the gospel in all parts of the world, despite changing political trends, highlighted the annual Seventh-day Adventist Autumn Council in St. Louis which closed November 16. Thus reported Pastor Walter Blehm to members of the Cottage Grove church this week.

During the 10-day meeting 500 delegates heard of church gains everywhere. A total of 63,014 adult baptisms in 1948 marked the largest membership increase in any one year. European division presidents reported membership at an all-time high.

Record offerings totaling \$42,302,388 were given by 672,658 Seventh-day Adventists throughout the world last year. Per capita giving for North American Adventists was \$135.70. Sabbath school members alone gave in their weekly offerings \$4,643,939 for foreign missions, it was disclosed by Washington, D. C. church officials who credited this branch of the church with raising more than \$70,000,000 for overseas work in the past 40 years.

Speakers emphasized the need for prayer and consecration in this atomic age of impending peril.

Arthur S. Maxwell, Mountain View, California, editor of the Signs of the Times, declared that political changes in the Far East, developments in Palestine, and the race for supremacy in atomic weapons fulfill the prophecies of Scripture and indicate that "we are swiftly moving into the closing scenes of human history which will climax with the return of Jesus to this earth."

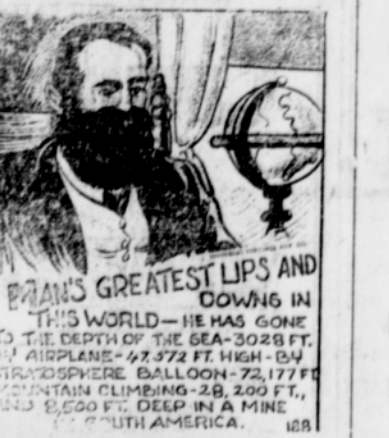
