99 Attend Annual Football Banquet of Lions Club Dec. 1st

Ninety-nine attended the annual high school football banquet at the high school cafeteria last Thursday evening which included members of the Lions club, business men and members of the A, B, and C football squads.

Orlo Bagley served as master of ceremonies, introducing the program numbers which included selections from the high school horn trio and the German band. A usual feature of the program was the introduction of the coaches, who in turn introduced members of the football squad. Bob Dusenberry, head high school coach introduced members of the A and B squads with a brief word about the accomplishments of each player. The 1949 season was a poor one from the standpoint of games won and lost, the Lions won two and lost six.

The principal reason for the 1949 showing was due to an unusual number of injuries, but these seasons will occur occasionally. Another reason was that the Lions scheduled two games with teams from larger schools, but according to Dusenberry the prospect is good that the schools of the state will be re-rated on the basis of the school attendance. The rating may be based on a B, AA and A rating, with the B rating for schools with enrollment up to 150, the AA for schools up to 600 and the AA for schools with enrollment of 600 or over.

Another difficulty which the high school is facing is due to the fact that only about 35 per cent of the new candidates for berths on the high school team have any previous football experience. Grade school training is supplied only thru the Jefferson school, but prospective players entering from any other of the surrounding schools do not have the opportunity to get this training. This is where the local high school may eventually be caught short and numerous large schools start the training period in grade schools, according to Dusenberry.

Coach Dusenberry also announced the 1950 football squad would have three captains: Jim Webb, Lowrey Hoyer and Wayne Schmitt. About half of the A squad will be lost thru graduation, he said.

Wallace Clochetti, who coached the C squad introduced members of the C squad in the same manner as the A and B squads were introduced. Introduction of the C squadders brought a good many laughs, due to the fact that the coaches had to resort to numerous tactics to make up for size and bulk. The C squadders it seems employed the so called "Coon Dog

Tactics" with good effects during the past season.

Pete Elliot, former Michigan player and line coach at OSC was introduced by Toastmaster Bagley as the only man he knew of to be awarded twelve athletic letters, ten was the previous record.

The guest speaker explained that football was different now because nearly every player is a specialist in his own line, which accounts for the big scores often made. You don't hear so much about the small scores with per-haps only a point's difference as in former years and one reason is that the public is demanding bigger scores. There are numerous trick plays employed now, which help to account for the high score.

The speaker said the chief satisfaction from football is not so many games won or lost, but as a player, "Do you do your best at all times?"

At the conclusion of the program, the assembly repaired to the high school auditorium to see a movie of the Oregon State-Washington State game. Everyone enjoyed the pictures except Palmer Johnson, who it seems made a bad and costly guess on the outcome of the game.

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Wrestling Clinic To Be Held at OSC December 16 - 17

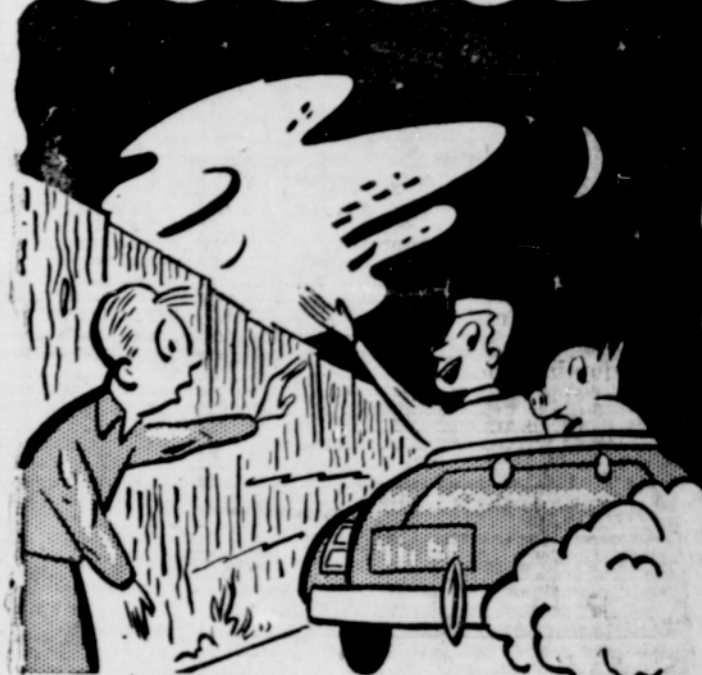
Oregon State College, Corvallis, December 6—By special request of last year's participants, a second annual high school wrestling clinic for prep coaches and directors and instructors in physical education will be held on the Oregon State campus December 16 and 17. Athletic Director Ray (Spec) Keene announced this week.

The popular event, which is offered as an in-service training by the division of physical education and department of intercollegiate athletics, will be directed by Bob Antonacci, varsity wrestling coach and former NCAA national champion in his weight class. Jim Dixon, associate professor of physical education, will aid in the program.

The two-day clinic will include three sessions—Friday afternoon, 2 to 5; Saturday morning, 9 to 12; and Saturday afternoon, 2 to 5. Covered in the program will be methods and techniques of coaching high school wrestling, administration and supervision of a strong mat program and the educational values derived from participating in wrestling.

Actual demonstrations by OSC varsity wrestlers and films of national championship matches will be special features of the clinic.
