C. A. Lockwood Is Reappointed Post St. Game Director

At the regular meeting of the Oregon State Game Commission December 10, the Oregon State Game Commission voted unanimously to reappoint Charles A. Lockwood to the post of State Game Director. Lockwood's appointment would have terminated at the end of the year.

Lockwood is a veteran employee of the Commission having served in nearly every department before becoming State Supervisor in 1947. The 1949 legislature changed the position to State Game Director, and since that time, Lockwood has held the new post.

Mr. Lockwood, at the present time, is president of the Western Association of Fish and Game Commissioners.

Upon receiving the reappointment, Lockwood reappointed Phil Schneider as Assistant Game Director, and this appointment was confirmed by the Commission.

Ducks to Invade Stanford 20-21

University of Oregon, Eugene, December 13—Coach John Warren of the Oregon Ducks renewed his intensive search for reserve strength this week as the Webfoots prepared for the series with Stanford University on Tuesday and Wednesday, December 20 and 21.

Warren had remarkable success with his "iron-men" in the second game with the Blue and Gold Nuggets, defeating the defending AAU champions 61 to 57 with a brilliant finish after a see-saw ball game. The entire Duck front line, Will Urban and Paul Sowers at forward and Mel Streeter at center, played the limit and starting guards, Mel Krause and Ken Hunt, did not get relief until only nine minutes remained in the game.

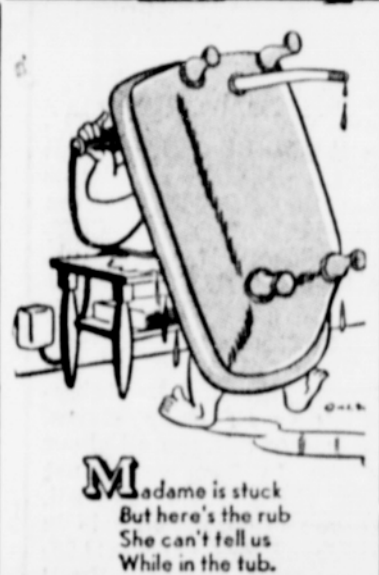
The second set of guards, Jack Keller and Bob Lavey, led the offense in the last Webfoot scoring spurt and Lavey piled up all seven of his points with less than three minutes remaining in the game. These seven players were the only Ducks to see action against the Nuggets.

In the tough set of games ahead, Coach Warren feels the top seven will need help if they are to be at top efficiency. At the present time it appears that John Neeley, the regular last year, has the best chance to break into the top guard foursome. Dale Warberg, Paul Cooper and Lynn Hamilton form the forward replacements and Bob Amacher and Bob Don are Streeter's replacements at center.

Streeter, a hustling youngster from Riverside JC, broke into the lineup to stay in the first "Blue and Gold" game. The sophomore's play ousted Bob Amacher from his job and although it robbed the front line of a "big" man, the overall result seemed worth the sacrifice.

With Streeter at center, the Ducks have no man over six feet three inches in the lineup. Both Urban and Streeter are 6-3, Sowers is 6-2 and Hunt and Krause are 5-11. The Ducks will be the shortest team in the Northern Division if this combination holds until the league season opens.

The Cottage Grove Lions, playing a return game with the Roseburg Indians at Roseburg Saturday night boosted their season's average to 500 with a second win over the southern team. The final score was 33-24. It was not until the final quarter that the Lions were able to salt the game away.

The first three quarters of the game was a see-saw affair, with Roseburg in the lead four times 2-1, 3-2, 9-8, and 12-11 and the count knotted as many times with the scores of 2-2, 9-9, 17-17, and 19-19. At the end of the third quarter the Lions led 21-19 and were never in danger after this.

Two Cottage Grove players stole the show there Saturday night according to a Roseburg version of the affair. Bill McBee, described as a short and speedy player fielded three baskets and netted four more from the foul line. Tall Bob Cook, figured prominently in practically all of the action and managed to raise his team's score by fifteen points, making three field goals and nine foul shots.

Beavers to Meet Utes Dec. 16-17 In New Coliseum

Oregon State College, Corvallis, December 13 — Oregon State's basketball team is preparing for its home openers against highly touted Utah in mammoth new Gill Coliseum Friday and Saturday nights after returning home Monday from a 10-day tour of the Midwest and east on which the Beavers broke even against four top-notch quintets.

The Utah series will launch a six-game pre-conference home schedule in the Coliseum, newest and finest basketball palace west of the Rockies. The huge hoop emporium will comfortably handle 10,200 fans with 85 per cent of the seats on the sides. Although the main floor will be practically 100 per cent finished by this week end, offices and basement dressing rooms will not be completed for several months.

Reserved seats for the non-conference contests are \$1.50 with general admission \$1.00. In addition to Utah, Indiana will be here December 20 and 21; Minnesota, the 27th; and Stewart Chevrolet of San Francisco, the 30th. All home games will start at 8 p.m. A new parking lot with facilities for 900 cars is located directly south of the Coliseum.

Utah, perennially a top ranking national hoop power, undoubtedly will offer the Orange rugged opposition in the home openers. Vadal Peterson's Redskins already have trounced Oregon, Southern California and Wyoming after winning nine out of ten on a November jaunt to Brazil.

Pacing the Redskins attack is Glen Smith, 6 foot 4 inch sophomore center who has averaged better than 12 points a game to date. He gets strong support from such veterans as Forward Jim Cleverly and Guard Glenn Duggins.

Oregon State showed flashes of real power in whipping New York University and Wisconsin on the road while losing to Canisius and Minnesota. Different interpretations of the rules hurt the Beavers on the road as both losses were at the free throw line.

Coach Slat's Gill probably will start Bob Payne and Ray Snyder at forwards against Utah with Len Rinearson at center and Dick Ballantyne and Bill Harper at guards. This combination clicked the best in recent games. Payne's flashy transfer from San Francisco junior college, paces the Orange in scoring for five games with 42. He is closely followed by Ballantyne with 40 and Rinearson with 39.



Early information on fishing conditions coming into this office is not encouraging.
