NATIONAL FOREST TIMBER FOR SALE

Oral auction bids will be received by the Regional Forester or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Roseburg, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 p.m. January 9, 1950, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 304 acres within sections 15, 16, 20, 21 and 22, T22S, R1E, W.M., surveyed, Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 15,343,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 1,024,000 feet B.M., more or less, of sugar pine, 533,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Western hemlock, 675,000 feet B.M., more or less, of Western redcedar, and an unestimated amount of Western white pine and other species of sawtimber and 75,375 lineal feet, more or less, of Western redcedar poles. Sealed bids accompanied by required payment received by the Forest Supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m. January 9, 1950, will be considered the equivalent of an oral bid and posted for the information of all bidders. The appraised value of the timber according to long-term, normal market and operating conditions is \$5.00 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$7.60 per M feet for sugar pine, \$7.60 per M feet for Western white pine, \$1.50 per M feet for Western hemlock and other species of sawtimber, and \$0.045 per lineal foot for Western redcedar poles. No bid will be considered which is less than these rates as a base rate applicable through the entire period of the sale agreement, plus at least \$4.05 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$12.00 per M feet for sugar pine, and \$12.00 per M feet for Western white pine, the total to apply for all timber cut prior to April 1, 1951. On that date and at other times, as stated in the contract, total rates will be redetermined, but in no event will the redetermined stumpage rates be less than the basic appraised value as first above stated, and in no event will rates below those bid be established until at least 6,000,000 feet B.M. have been cut and paid for at not less than the bid rates. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$0.05 per M feet B.M. to be used by the Forest Service for partially paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$0.30 per M feet B.M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of sawtimber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$15,000.00 to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the condition of sale, must accompany each sealed bid and must be shown to be in the possession of oral bidders as a qualification for auction bidding. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately make the required payment and confirm the bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, the District Ranger, Disston, Oregon, or the Regional Forester, Portland, Oregon. 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CULP CREEK MAN FILES \$5,489 DAMAGE SUIT

Otto Janis, Culp Creek log hauler filed a \$5,489 damage suit in Lane county circuit court Thursday against the A. B. Scarlett Motor Co., of Eugene. In filing the suit, Janis contends that the Eugene firm sold him a rebuilt and reconitioned vehicle instead of a new G.M.C. truck. Janis charged that shortly after the purchase of the truck, mechanical difficulties began to appear and in May of 1949 when he took the truck to the garage for the first time, he discovered the truck was not new, but had been rebuilt. He further asserted that the mechanical faults, present in the truck had caused a misalignment of the wheels, which in turn caused unnecessary wear on the tires. He asked for damages to cover the time and expenses which resulted in taking his truck to the repair shop.

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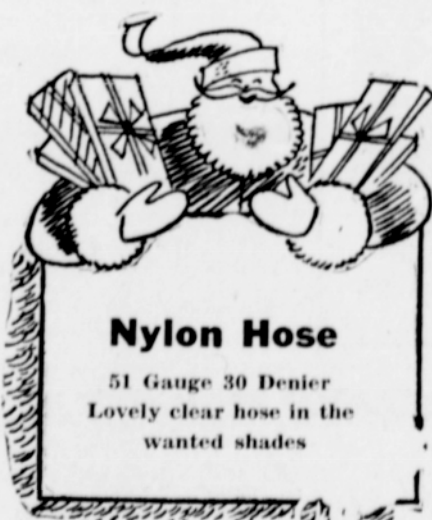
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
