The answers to everyday insurance problems

QUESTION: In a recent discussion of various types of insurance covering damage and theft of things like jewelry, furs and luggage, one of our friends with some insurance experience kept comparing "regular" fire and theft policies with what he called "floaters." Can you tell me what difference there is between these policies?

ANSWER: There is a basic difference in these two kinds of insurance. Under the "regular" policy, the insurance company states the various types of loss for which it will pay and it is not liable for losses not specifically mentioned in the policy. In the "floater" the company is liable in all losses not specifically excluded by the policy. Any good insurance agent can tell you which is best in your individual case.

Salmon Smell Their Way Home

Discovery that migrating salmon probably smell their way back home from the sea was reported to the American Association for the advancement of science at New York yesterday.

The discovery was made at the University of Wisconsin by training salmon minnows. These little things learned to discriminate between the waters from different lakes by the differences in the smell.

The experiments were done by Prof. Arthur D. Hasler and by Warren Wisby. Blind minnows were used. They were trained by receiving food when they swam in water from one lake, but, by being given a mild electric shock, if they chose the water from another lake.

Finally they chose the lake that gave them food in preference to all others regardless of what happened.

How salmon find their way back to the same river and same creek from thousands of miles at sea has been one of the great fish mysteries.

Big Bob Cook Leads Teammates In 36-34 Victory

The Cottage Grove Lions, led by Big Bob Cook, last year's scoring champ, won the fourth consecutive cage victory at Eugene Friday night when they met and defeated the University high 36 to 34. Cook had a field day under the backboards and when the final whistle sounded he had accounted for 22 of his teammates' 36 points.

The Lions led the game most of the way and early in the fourth quarter had a 36 to 28 lead for the biggest margin of separation between the two teams. Late in the fourth quarter the Tigers staged a determined rally and were only two points behind when the game ended.

The first quarter score was 9-7 lead for the Tigers. In the second quarter Cook went to work and aided by Gasper gained a 19-17 lead for the Grovers and went on for a 30-27 lead at the end of the third quarter.

Efficient Fertilizer Use Boosts Yields

Good Soil Management Must Aid Plant Food

Every ton of fertilizer can be stretched or used more efficiently, boosting crop yields at the same time. Many farmers, says Middle West Soil Improvement committee, use fertilizer as a crutch. They try to make it substitute for good management practices. They put plant food in the soil without making sure the plant can send out its roots to use it.

Fertilizer is essential in giving the soil plant nutrients to feed crops. But fertilizer can't do the whole job. It must be teamed with other practices that build and maintain soil structure and keep the top soil "matted down."

The soil needs good structure so roots can grow and reach out for plant food. Roots need air and water to live. When a soil is packed down and tight, there is no room for the air and water needed by roots and plants for high crop production.

The way to build soil structure is to grow legumes and grasses regularly in the rotation. These legumes make a thick layer of good soil. They add organic matter. Such soil has plenty of air space. Water soaks in quickly and more of it is held.

Weak, scattered stands of legumes won't build soil structure. For strong, leafy stands and vigorous roots, the legumes need phosphate and potash that can be added in commercial fertilizer. Getting thick stands isn't the whole story either. All these crops can't be cut for hay or graze close and still be expected to build the soil. At least a part of these crops must be turned back to the soil.

Enamelware

Because enameled utensils have a smooth, non-porous glass coating, home economists recommend them for preparing, storing and reheating foods. The glass-on-steel construction of enamelware prevents it from absorbing food odors.

Britain has played the leading role in the development of modern farm livestock, and is still the stud farm of the world.

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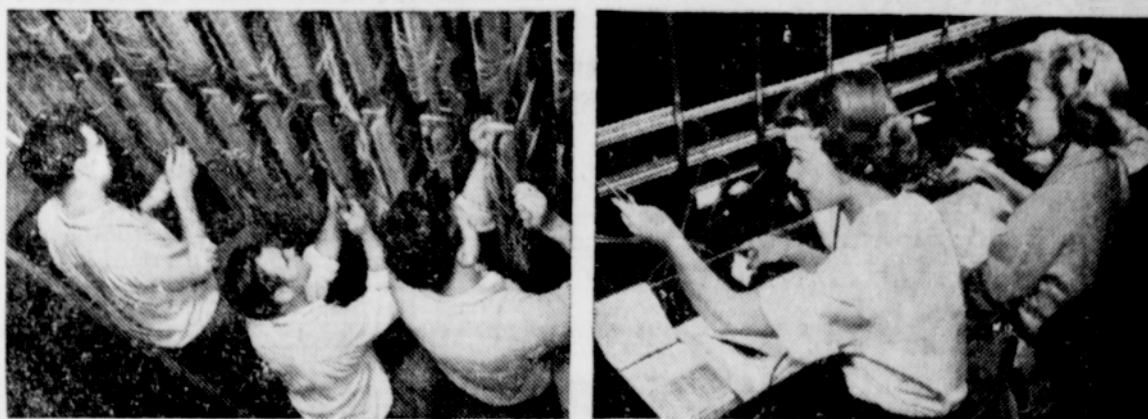
