Lions Win Gael Game in Last Three Minutes of Play

The Cottage Grove Lions, putting on a last minute spurs, pulled a cage game out of the fire when they met and defeated the St. Mary's Gaels of Eugene on the local high school court last Friday evening for the fifth consecutive win of the season. The final count was 36-33.

When the Lions went into the final quarter they were trailing 31-23. Bob Cook, Bob Gasper and Ben Hilliker knotted the count 32 all with three minutes to go. A minute later Bill McBee made two free throws to force two points in the lead. The Gaels were not

able to score a single field goal in the final quarter. St. Mary's led 7-4 in the first quarter, 20-14 at half time and 31-23 at the end of the 3rd quarter. Hilliker was high point man for the Lions with 9 points followed by Gasper with 8. Krasneski led St. Mary's scoring with 14 points.

The B squaders defeated the Gael B squad 39 to 22. Isley maintained his reputation as a leading point gainer and was credited with 20 points out of a total 39.

Lions Turn On Heat to Win Sixth Cage Victory 48-40

The surging Lion quintet turned on the heat in the final quarter Tuesday night at Willamette to defeat the Willamette high school cage squad 48 to 40, after trailing the Willamette leads several times in the last half of the game. Cottage Grove managed to get a 5-0 lead in the first three minutes before the Willamette team could ring up a counter. The Lions led 12-7 at the end of the first quarter, 22-20 at the half. Willamette tied the score 24-24 in the third quarter and went on to garner a three point lead for the first time during the game. Ben Hilliker pulled the Lions into a 31-31 tie, then sent them in front 34-33. Martin shot a field goal from the corner to give the Groves a 36-33 lead. The lead moved back and forth several times in the final quarter. Will-Hi held a 40-39 lead until the last six minutes. Hilliker made a tip in to put his team miles out in front, quickly followed by two free throws by Cook and a tip in by Gasper gave the Lions a 45-40 lead. A free throw by Gasper and a long shot by Hilliker made the final count 48-40.

Hilliker turned in a fine performance with the top honors for scoring with 18 points to his credit. Cook followed with 16. Paul Jackson was high scorer for Will-Hi, getting 16 points. It was the sixth consecutive victory for the Groves and their first in district 6 loop.

The Lion B squad finished off a perfect day in the preliminaries with a 32-13 victory over the Will-Hi B squaders.

Jack Kramer to Be at McArthur Court February 8

Eugene, January 4—Professional tennis, featuring the top net talent in the world today, will make its Willamette Valley debut at McArthur Court on February 8 at 8 p.m. Final arrangements for the appearance of Jack Kramer, Pancho Gonzales, Frank Parker and Pancho Segura were made this week by Leo Harris, athletic director at the University of Oregon, with Bobby Riggs, director of the world-wide tour.

The event is being sponsored by the University of Oregon with the aid of the Eugene Tennis club and will mark the first time such a talented group of tennis stars have ever played before Willamette Valley sports fans.

The group is currently touring Europe after a highly successful jaunt through the eastern part of the United States. The highlight of the evening will be the match between Jack Kramer, the defending professional champion, and Pancho Gonzales, the national amateur title holder, who is making his first attempt at pro tennis. The other singles match will send Frank Parker, the former U. S. amateur champion, against Pancho Segura, one of the best South American tennis aces ever to invade the United States.

After the four stars have played the two single matches, they will team up to end the program with a doubles match. Kramer, who is now in his prime after having swept through all competition for the past few years, is getting consistently tougher opposition from Gonzales, the sensational youngster from Los Angeles.

The spacious suite of McArthur Court is ideally suited for tennis and the balcony and bleachers will both be ideal for watching top flight tennis. Special seating arrangements are planned and the Igloo will hold more than 7,000 fans for the event.

Tickets will be sealed at \$1.80 for reserved seats, 90 cents for general admission and 50 cents for students and children. Applications for reserved seats are now being taken at the McArthur Court ticket offices.

FREAK DEER KILLED

Ernest Luke of Portland killed a two-point mule deer doe in Harney county near Burns, the deer weighing 115 pounds. E. A. Emery of Klamath Falls also downed a 152-pound antlered doe. Mrs. Ernest F. Stormer of Portland bagged a freak buck on Larch Mountain. The deer had whitetail horns but a tail that definitely belonged to the Columbian black-tail species. The buck weighed 227 pounds.

Chrysler 1950 Models Are Being Shown; 19 Body Styles Are Listed

In its 1950 line, now on display in dealers' show-rooms throughout the country, Chrysler offers new styling, inside and out, including entirely new upholstery in virtually all models; the introduction of an entirely new body style available in both the six- and eight-cylinder lines; improvements in the instrument panel, larger brakes on the six-cylinder models and an improved booster on the brakes of the eights; increased visibility through rear window that has 27 per cent more glass area; a slight increase in height, width and length, a wider rear tread on numerous features introduced in the 1949 models. Nineteen body styles are listed and 15 standard body colors, eight of which are entirely new.

Appearance improvements begin at the front bumper and are carried through to the rear bumper, giving the new line distinction and individuality. Different styling features have been incorporated in the sixes and in the eights, so that one is readily distinguishable from the other at first glance. Among the points of difference between the two lines are the parking lights, the length of the molding on the front fender, the nameplate on the front of the radiator and the wheel cover.

Front-end styling features an entirely new die-cast grille, comprising three heavy horizontal bars of chrome. These bars extend out to wrap around the fender. In the eights, a new round parking light is installed in a chrome grille plate underneath each headlight. This chrome plate fills the space between the top and bottom bars of the grille. Seven thin vertical bars are placed between the horizontal bars of the grille. A new enameled nameplate with chrome wings is placed just above the center of the grille in the sixes. The name Chrysler in script is used on the eights in this position. There is a new hood ornament placed lower on the hood.
