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TODAYS Menu

Deviled Shrimp Pie Is Unusual

OFFERED today is the popular grab-bag of recipes from which we hope our friends will extract a pleasing recipe or suggestion.

First is a Friday special, a Deviled Shrimp Pie that is different and delicious. To serve 6, mix 1/2 cup dry mustard, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. paprika, and a dash of cayenne. Add to one c. medium white sauce with 2 tbsp. chopped parsley, 1 tsp. lemon juice and 2 1/2 c. cooked shrimp or 2 Number 1 cans of shrimp. Pour shrimp mixture into 6 greased ramekins or one 9-inch pie plate. File 2 c. fluffy mashed potatoes around edges of casseroles or pie plate. Bake at 375 F. for 20 min.

For another shrimp dish melt 3 tbsp. butter or margarine; add 1/2 c. soft bread crumbs, one c. milk, 1 1/2 c. or a Number 1 can shrimps,

chopped, and 2 tbsp. chopped pimento. Beat 2 eggs; add with tsp. salt and few grains of pepper. Pour into 4 individual oiled molds. Bake at 325 F. for 45 min.

Nice First Course

For a nice first course, with an appropriate holiday air, freeze cranberry juice in automatic refrigerator trays, then beat it with a fork, and serve in center of grapefruit halves. Or spice up Sunday breakfast with crushed peppermint stick candy on the grapefruit.

For another fine breakfast special, place slices of bread under the broiler and toast on one side. Butter the other side. Spread with jellied cranberry sauce and cover with sliced bananas. Sprinkle with brown sugar, and a small amount of cinnamon. Broil slowly until the bananas are a light brown, and the cranberry sauce is bubbling.
