

WORLD OPIUM AGENCY

PLANNED BY U. N. GROUP

ANKARA, Turkey — The first international buying and selling agency for all of the world's supply of opium was foreshadowed here in a recent United Nations meeting of representatives of the major opium-producing countries.

The meeting, attended by India, Iran, Turkey and Yugoslavia, recommended establishment of an international opium agency with the exclusive right to buy the production of opium producing nations and to sell it to consuming countries. The agency would be set up as a corporation within the U. N. structure.

U. N. officials indicated that the plan would produce tighter controls over illicit traffic in opium and, at the same time, make sure that supplies for medicinal and scientific uses were available.

The plan will next be reviewed by the U. N. Commission on Narcotic Drugs in April or May.

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Sheep Circular Shows Way to Greater Profits

A workable set of sheep records will net Oregon sheep producers greater profits and will speed up improvement of stock through the more efficient selection of animals, W. G. Cadmus, research assistant in animal husbandry for the O.S.C. agricultural experiment station, reports in a new circular.

Titled "Sheep Records for Greater Profits," the publication presents a simple record system developed by the animal husbandry department that can be used to advantage by any commercial or purebred sheep producer. Copies of the publication may be obtained free from county agents or from the college.

Progress in improving livestock is slow at best when selection of animals is made on appearance alone, Cadmus points out, because many factors which affect productivity—such as fertility—cannot be evaluated by the eye alone.

"It has been demonstrated," he says "that it takes 20 to 30 times as long for improvement in livestock by selection on appearance alone as compared to selection on appearance coupled with production records."

Developing a system of production record will help eliminate some of the guess work in ram and ewe selection and will give the breeder who has records a distinct advantage in the sale of his stock, Cadmus explains.

The record system outlined in the publication calls for individual cards to be maintained on both ewes and rams. Cards are pictured in the publication along with the explanation on how they should be filled out and what to look for on the record cards in selecting animals for the flock.

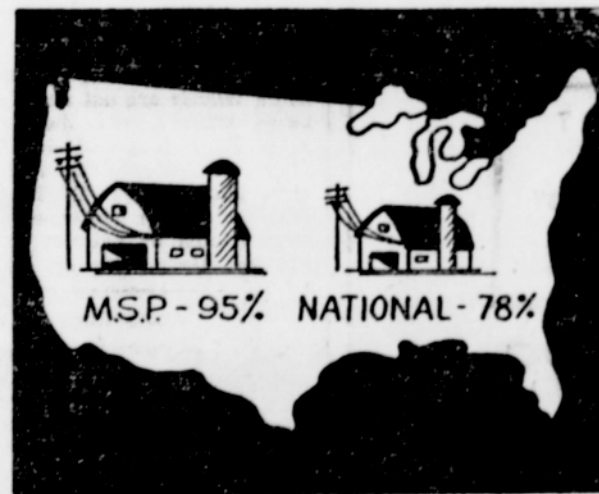
