**Now you know!**

**QUESTION:** We plan to leave on a long vacation motor trip within the next couple of weeks and a friend suggests that we take out a special theft insurance policy on our luggage, jewelry and other valuables which we take with us. Can you tell me whether we can get a short term policy of this kind and whether its cost is low enough so it would pay us to buy it?

**ANSWER:** Ordinarily, if you already have a Residence Theft policy on your valuables, the simplest and most economical thing for you to do would be to have the "theft away from the premises" clause added to it and to pay the small additional premium. This coverage is usually a good deal broader than that given by a "personal effects" floater policy which you would buy for the duration of your trip. If you don't have a Residence Theft policy, you should consult your insurance agent about it before buying any other form of insurance.

**OSC to Shuffle Activities for Better Service**

Oregon State College—A new year's gift to the students of Oregon State and the citizens of the state as well will be the provision during the new year of better quarters for college dramatics, the Horner Museum of the Oregon County, the band, orchestra and other large musical groups.

Work on this combined \$70,000 remodeling, moving and building project will start early in the new year, though some of the major items will have to await the summer vacation period. The project was approved by the state board of higher education at a recent meeting.

The Horner museum, which attracts some 20,000 visitors annually, will be moved to fireproof quarters for the first time, into expanded space provided in the basement of the new college collection. The famous pioneer collections have long been overcrowded in the basement of the old museum building, one of the oldest structures here and which has served successively as armory and men's and women's gymnasium.

The museum building, still structurally sound, will be remodeled into a campus theater and workshop for classes in dramatics and related subjects. The upper part will be converted into a comfortable 700-seat theater for all campus plays and for smaller assemblies.

The inadequate space in old Benton hall, now used by dramatics classes, will be renovated and remodeled for use by the music department, largely for its large choruses and glee club groups which long ago outgrew their quarters.

Finally a new Butler type prefabricated building will be constructed on the physical plant property east of the armory as a headquarters for the band and orchestra. These have heretofore used the old museum building for practice and instrument storage, causing many scheduling conflicts.

The band and orchestra will thus have adequate facilities for the first time in many years which they will use until facilities are provided in permanent future buildings. At that time the Butler type building can be taken over without loss by the physical plant.

**Growers to Hear About Southern Seed Conditions**

How Oregon-grown alta fescue grass seed is farming in competition with Kentucky 31 in the southern states will be reported at the forthcoming annual meeting of the Oregon Seed Growers league in Portland, January 9, 10 and 11. League Secretary E. H. Jackson, O. S. C. extension farm crops specialist, has announced.

All general sessions will be held in the Multnomah hotel, starting daily at 10 a.m., says R. Wallace Rice, Grants Pass, president. The annual banquet January 10 will feature Governor Douglas McKay. Two prominent seed industry spokesmen, Carey Strome, Junction City, and Alec Cellars, McMinnville, have recently returned from attending the annual meeting of the Southern Seedsmen's association in New Orleans. They will report their findings on market conditions to the state's alta fescue seed growers the afternoon of January 9.

Bulk of Oregon's alta fescue grass seed, Jackson explains, is sold for forage and soil conservation purposes in the southern states. Kentucky 31 a similar grass competes with alta fescue seed throughout the area.

New potato marketing techniques will be on display during the league's potato committee meeting the afternoon of January 10. Chairman M. B. McKay, Troutdale says the display will include waxed potatoes, specially processed peeled potatoes, canned and frozen French fries. Regular grades will be on display to show growers the spread in price between poor and good potatoes as well as price difference between various producing areas.

The malting barley committee plans to hold a luncheon meeting in Vancouver, Washington, January 10. It will be followed by a tour of the Great Western Malting company plant.

Chairman of the legislative, farm-owned cleaning plants, weeds, marketing problems and outlook committees have also called meetings of their groups.

Discussion of weed control methods will be featured the opening day, January 9.
