'Caterpillar Day' to Be Observed Jan. 10 In Eugene by Interstate Tractor Co.

Entertainment, exhibits, movies, and a gigantic review of Western power farming history and modern tillage methods will be featured during John Deere "Caterpillar" Day to be presented for local ranchers and their families Tuesday, January 10th at 10:30 by Interstate Tractor and Equipment Co., Eugene in their store, it was announced today by Sam Rodway, manager.

"Our purpose in sponsoring this affair is to offer our guests some practical dollar-making farming ideas, such as the use of modern implement hitches, new ways to cut upkeep costs, and application of profitable new farming methods," says Mr. Rodway, in making the announcement. "We've arranged a display of equipment designed expressly for this idea, and will show many other applications which have been tested and proved by Western agriculture and through intensive research by 'Caterpillar' and John Deere."

"The show, which is coordinated with similar presentations throughout the Western States, is tailored for our guests. It will give them an inside look at the importance and recognition afforded Western agriculture by the nation as a whole."

Highlights of John Deere "Cat-

pillar" Day will include the showing of sound and color moving pictures.

"With an Eye to the Future" shows the development saga of modern tractor power and equipment produced specifically by John Deere to meet the needs of West Coast farmers and ranchers, and to introduce on film new products manufactured in Los Angeles, California and Yakima, Washington. Washed Eggs

It is harmful to wash eggs, says O. C. Ufford, poultry specialist for the Colorado A. & M. college extension service, because the shell of an egg is porous or full of tiny holes. These are filled with a gelatinous covering that keeps out bacteria. When eggs are washed it dissolves the protective covering and not only removes the dirt but may force some bacteria through the shell where they proceed to spoil the eggs.

The first such meeting is most important for those planning to make wool dresses under Extension trained project leaders. It is the required preliminary meeting. This lesson will be a duplicate of that held last October at which wool fabrics and patterns suitable for use with a wool fabric were discussed. All those planning to make dresses who have not already attended the Better Dress Workshop preliminary meeting should plan to be present in order to qualify for a workshop. The meeting will be held at the Eugene Vocational School, 751 West 4th Avenue, Eugene, 1:30 to 3:00, on January 9, for all women who intend to make a dress.

January 10, 4-H Club Unit leaders and Azalea House Chairmen will gather at the "Y" Center at 1:00 o'clock for their long delayed Officers' Training Day. Lane County will welcome Miss Esther Taskerud, State Extension Agent (4-H), who will be present to explain the basic ideals and work of the State 4-H Club program.
