### GILL COLISEUM SUCCESS

Oregon State College, Corvallis, January 10 - Mammoth new Gill basketball coliseum already has proved itself a success. A total of 30,916 fans were attracted to Oregon State's six home pre-conference games in December.

The average attendance of more than 5,000 is considered highly significant because most of the students were home for vacation when four of the contests were played.

Almost as many fans have attended six games as normally have been able to see Oregon State's complete home slate in the antiquated men's gym in the year's past.

## Lions Down Uni Hi Tiders 2nd Time Here Friday 39-24

The Cottage Grove Lions met and defeated the Eugene University Hi Tiders Friday night on the Cottage Grove court 39-24 for the second time this season and for their seventh consecutive victory. It was a close game throughout the 60 minutes of play, but the Lions finally emerged as victors.

The Tiders took the tip, but failed to score until after Abe Cruse hit the hoop with a long push shot. Smith of the Tiders immediately tied the game up with two gift shots. In fact the first quarter was a see saw affair. Bob Cook's free throw gave the Grovers a one point lead 10-9 to end the first quarter. The second quarter was more or less of a repetition of the first quarter with the Lions in the lead two to three points at intervals, but the Tiders were always quick to counter and tied the score at half time, 19-19.

The Tiders took the lead for the first time in the beginning of the third quarter and went ahead 21-19. Cook then sank a gift shot, but Moriarity hit one from the field to give the visitors a 23-20 lead. Cruse of the Lions quickly made two more points with a field goal, but this gain was quickly offset by a field goal by the Tiders by Smith. A field goal by Cook and Abe Cruse put the Lions in the lead to stay, but by a small margin. It was late in the fourth quarter that the Lions got a comfortable five point lead. Only one man was lost by the foul route, Moriarity of the Tiders.

Cruse was high point man for the Lions with 15 counters followed by Smith of Uni-Hi with 14. The Lion juniors earlier made it a perfect day for the Grovers with a convincing 36-21 victory over the Golden Tiders. Dave Small led the Groves juniors with 15.

### TOP RANKING TENNIS PLAYERS AT Mc COURT

University of Oregon, Eugene, January 10 - The world's top ranking tennis players, like the world's best in any sport, have caught the fancy of sports followers throughout the Willamette Valley and a capacity of 7,000 is not unlikely when Bobby Riggs brings his all-star tennis troupe to McArthur Court at 8 p.m. on February 8.

Reservations have already been received at the University of Oregon athletic ticket offices. The Eugene appearance will be the only stop for the court greats between Portland and Sacramento and fans are expected from as far north as Salem, east to Bend and Redmond, south to Medford and Klamath Falls, and west along the coast.

Three of the four netmen who play next month have won all the U. S. singles titles since 1944. Frank Parker won the first two, Jack Kramer the next pair, and Pancho Gonzales captured the title in 1948 and 1949. Riggs also won the title in 1939 and 1941 and Segura was the indoor champion in 1946.

## Oregon, Ore. State To Meet Friday In Crucial Tilt

Oregon State College, Corvallis, January 10 - Oregon State's defending northern division champion basketball team will make an all-out effort to grab the first leg of the annual four-game series with arch-rival Oregon when the two clubs inaugurate 1950 competition in Gill coliseum here Friday night. Game time is 8 p.m.

Coach Slat's Gill, leaving no stone unturned, scouted the Webfoots in both their games against Washington State last weekend, came home with the warning to his squad that the Ducks will be a hard nut to beat. Like the Beavers, Oregon split with touted WSC.

Ways of stopping Paul Sowers, high scoring guard; and Will Urban, all-around good forward, is causing Gill the most concern. Sowers potted 31 in the Cougar series despite the fact Ed Gayda, WSC's best guard, was checking him, and led John Warren's men to their victory the first night.

The Beavers should be in their best shape of the season to date for the initial Oregon game. Big Ed Fleming has completely recovered from an eye injury and Guard Jack Detour is back in good shape after receiving a painful hip bruise in the second WSC game.

Present indications are Gill will start Bob Payne and Jim Padgett at forwards; Len Rinearson, center; and Dick Ballantyne and Bill Harper, guards. This combination packs the most speed and scoring punch and clicked the best against the Cougars. Harper, a standout as a sophomore last year, apparently has hit his stride again after a slow start this winter.

Although a capacity crowd of close to 10,000 fans is expected, some good reserve seats are still available at Memorial Union 104. An undisclosed number of general admissions will go on sale at the gates.

The game began slow with the visitors taking the tip, but they failed to score. The first count of the game came two minutes later on Bill McBee's free throw. Bob Gasper then hit one from the field to take a 3-0 lead. A gift shot by Ben Hilliker and a field goal by lanky Bob Cook gave the hometown boys a 6-2 lead. Lunde made a gift shot for the Spartans and that was the extent of the Spartan scoring in the first quarter. The Lions went on to build up a 10-3 quarter lead.

The second quarter was likewise slow with the Grovers scoring four points and the visitors four. The second quarter however was played on more even terms with the Spartans making 14 points to the Lions 15.

The top scorer for the visitors was Taylor with 9 counters. High man of the game was Bob Cook of the Lions with 13. The game was featured by McBee and Gasper handling the ball while good work was done by Hilliker and Cruse grabbing the rebounds.

## Antelope Meeting To Be Held Jan. 24

The second annual interstate antelope meeting, attended by representatives of the Oregon, Idaho, California, and Nevada Game Commissions, will be held January 24 at Hunter's Inn in Lakeview, announced Robert Mace, Chief of Big Game for the Oregon State Game Commission. Representatives of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service will also be present.

The game agents will compare antelope census figures, herd composition data, and kill figures for all four states. Mace pointed out that antelope do not recognize state lines in their movements. Antelope in Oregon frequently move into Idaho, Nevada, and northeastern California. It is essential to assemble information from all four states if the antelope are to be properly managed continued Mace.

Representatives for the Oregon State Game Commission are William Lightfoot, Paul Bonn, Ellis Mason, Cecil Langdon, and Robert Mace.

### SPORTSMEN TO PARTICIPATE IN REGULATION HEARINGS

Sportsmen are making numerous recommendations regarding the 1950 angling regulations, stated Mr. Charles A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game Director. Lockwood reminded anglers that the

public hearing concerning angling regulations will be held in the Portland office of the Oregon State Game Commission at 10:00 a.m., January 13.

The public is invited, and representatives of organizations and individuals will all be heard. For accuracy in the record though, Lockwood requested that all im-

portant fact and statements be submitted in writing.

Tentative regulations for the coming year will be announced after the public hearing. The Commission will reconvene after a two week interval, make any changes deemed necessary, and set the final angling regulations for the year 1950.
