Following the business meeting the girls went as a group to the church parlor and attended the meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

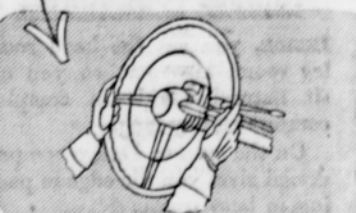
SCOUT TROOP MOVING
