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The answers to everyday insurance problems*

QUESTION: My hobby is photography and during the past several years I've accumulated equipment worth quite a respectable sum of money. I've always listed the equipment in my regular Residence Theft insurance but when I recently purchased a rather expensive camera I was told it would be a good idea to take out a special camera insurance policy. Can you tell me how to go about it?

ANSWER: So long as your photography is of the amateur variety, it would be better to continue insuring your equipment under your Residence Theft policy. If you will make sure that the "theft away from the premises" clause is included and that your particularly valuable pieces of equipment are individually insured for their full value in the policy, you'll have pretty complete protection.
