Cottage Grove Lake Registers Increase In Visiting During 1949 for 4th Year

For the fourth consecutive year there was an increase in the number of visitors to Cottage Grove dam on the Coast Fork Willamette river, one of the first units completed of the Willamette River Basin flood control project, according to Col. Donald S. Burns, Portland district engineer.

At Fern Ridge dam on the Long Tom river, however, the other early flood control structure, total number of visitors dropped 2,107 for the first time since the project's construction. The total number of general visitors, however, increased at both dams.

A total of 63,578 persons visited Cottage Grove dam in 1949 as compared with 65,226 in 1948, and a total of 118,280 visited Fern

Ridge in 1949 as compared with 120,387 in 1948.

The number of bathers increased at Fern Ridge and decreased at Cottage Grove, while the total fishermen at both projects decreased during the past year. Hunters increased at Fern Ridge and decreased at Cottage Grove while the number of automobiles reversed this procedure. The use of boats at both reservoirs dropped.

Fishing, hunting and trapping at Fern Ridge was reported as generally good throughout 1949, while at Cottage Grove, trout fishing was fair, cat-fishing was good and hunting fairly good throughout the season, but not as good as the previous season.

Series of Police Training Schools To Get Underway

To further advance the efficiency and professional standing of city and county police in Oregon, a new series of police training classes will be conducted in ten cities of the state during the next three months under the sponsorship of the Oregon Association of City Police Officers and the Oregon State Sheriffs' Association. Announcement of the new training program was made by Chief of Police Keith L. Jones of Eugene, chairman of the organization's training committee.

Supplementing the program carried out in the basic training schools held last summer, the new series will consist of nine special classes to be conducted by representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, state police department, and the Portland police department. The first four will provide advanced, technical treatment of such subjects as laboratory work in criminal investigation, interviews, preliminary crime investigation and traffic enforcement. The final five classes will cover practical problems in the handling of burglary cases and will feature a complete "on the scene" investigation, interrogation of suspects and a moot court trial of the "accused."

DR. McSWAIN SPEAKER AT OREGON COLLEGE OF ED.

Oregon College of Education, Monmouth—Dr. Eldridge Tracy McSwain, nationally-noted expert on education and community relations, will be featured speaker at the first Oregon College Conference on Parent-Teacher Cooperation. The conference will meet January 19 on OCE's campus. Dr. McSwain is Professor of Education and Dean of University College at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois. He is widely known for his extensive research and development activity in community relations of teachers, pupils and parents. He was a speaker at the Oregon Education Association convention in Portland last spring.

ROAD, STREET PROBLEMS TO BE AIDED AT OSC MEET

Oregon State College—Problems of designing, building and paying for Oregon's roads and streets—both from the engineering and taxpaying standpoints—will be discussed at the second annual roads and streets conference at Oregon State college February 23 and 24.

The meeting of engineers, city officials, state highway officials and others interested in these problems is sponsored by the O.S.C. department of civil engineering and the student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Cooperating in the program are the League of Oregon Cities, Association of County Engineers of Oregon, Oregon state highway department and the Pacific coast division of the Asphalt Institute. Speakers will include city and highway authorities in Oregon and Washington.

69,000 Seek Work Largest Number Since the War

Oregon's employment offices reported 69,000 persons actively seeking work this week for the largest year-end figure since the war. This compared with 55,300 a month ago and 59,600 a year ago, according to the State Unemployment Compensation commission.

Most of last month's unemployed came from lumber and logging districts, where cold weather and snow brought about curtailment of operations. The December increase of 13,700 was considerably under the 22,000 lay-offs reported during December, 1948, and officials remained hopeful that this winter's peak, probably in February, would fall short of the 93,000 all-time high reported a year ago.

Highest numerical increase from any local office area came from Eugene, where 6,200 were available for jobs compared with 4,650 a month ago and 3,600 a year ago. The biggest percentage increase, however, was at Bend, where unemployment jumped from 600 to 1,300 during December because of seasonal shutdowns in construction, lumber and logging, and food processing.

In the Portland area 22,500 were reported out of work—1,200 more than a month ago and about 5,000 more than a year ago. Exact comparisons with last year, however, were not available because of the establishment last May of a new employment office at Hillsboro to serve Washington county. Snow in the foothills and other seasonal conditions upped Hillsboro's idle workers from 1,600 to 2,600 last month.

Other offices with increases of more than 50 per cent included: Medford 1,400 to 2,250; Oregon City 1,950 to 3,100; The Dalles 325 to 800; Baker 625 to 950; and Lebanon 1,200 to 1,800. Least change was noted at Freewater, where only 15 were added to December 1 report of 600 workers.

U. of O. Had 589 Graduate Students Enrolled in 1949

Eugene, Oregon (Special)—Enrollment in the graduate school of the University of Oregon for fall term 1949 has set a new record of 589 students, an increase of 47 per cent over last year and 140 per cent over the prewar high. Dean Eldon L. Johnson announced today. His announcement was part of a report on significant developments in the graduate area during the past two years.

While recognizing that the school still is comparatively small, the report emphasizes the need for specialization in a few areas in place of large scale expansion. By actually trimming the graduate offerings during the past year, major areas have been developed which have attracted more "quality" candidates, the report says. One of the strengths of the program is the University's organization, new in education, of combining the graduate area and college of liberal arts under one administrative head. This encourages closer correlation of effort and permits the dean to make adjustments in the staff, personnel and budget of undergraduate departments to the benefit of the graduate program.

Among the recommendations for improvement is one to study the feasibility of strengthening the University Press to the end of making it the dominant interpreter of the region. Further heavy emphasis on the library program, expenditures for which have increased 171 per cent during the past two years, also is recommended.
