Louise Rozelle Cunningham, 62, pioneer resident of Douglas County, died Jan. 5 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mary Hill, Drain. She was born at Drain, June 27, 1887, the daughter of a pioneer family, and married Franklin P. Cunningham at Sunnydale Valley in October 1911. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving are her widower; three daughters and two sons; Mrs. Hill, of Sunnydale, Horace and Bruce, of Drain, Mrs. Catherine Hunt and Mrs. Faye Root, Terrebonne; a sister, Mrs. Esther Brown, Camas Valley; 11 grandchildren and two step-grandchildren.

Services were held at Drain Christian Church Sunday at 1 p.m., with the Rev. William M. Myers officiating. Interment was in Putnam Cemetery with the Stearns Mortuary, Oakland, in charge.

Land Use Problems Under Irrigation Studied at OSC

A long-range study of the land use problems on new irrigation projects has been started by the O.S.C. agricultural station to help in the effective planning and development of new irrigation areas.

The study is being conducted on farms on the North Unit of the Deschutes Irrigation Project in Jefferson county with Dr. C. V. Plath, associate agricultural economist, as project leader. Working with him is Howard A. Osborn, graduate assistant.

Only limited information is available at present upon which to base recommendations for land use and size of farm on various grades of land under new irrigation projects, Dr. Plath explains. The new study is designed to supply this information and to facilitate planning of new projects and to assist farmers going onto the project in farm planning and operation.

The capital required to operate farms under new irrigation projects will be studied including such items as cost of preparing land for use and capital needs during the early years of farm development.

Records of selected farm on each of the various land classes have been collected this fall and will be analyzed to determine the land use adjustments needed on various quality soils. Year-to-year records from these farms will be gathered during the next five years as a means of charting the growth and development of the newly irrigated farms.
