## Flood Liberates Young Salmon at Bandon Hatchery

Flood waters burst an earth dam Sunday at the Bandon fish hatchery, swept through two fish ponds, and liberated 15,000 young silver salmon. Water poured thru the dam over-flow in such volume that it cut into the earth-filled portion of the dam. When the dam gave way, the water swept down into the fish ponds directly below the dam and on into Ferry creek. The silver salmon, which were eight to ten inches in length, are now drifting down Ferry creek to the Coquille river and from there to the Pacific ocean. Three years from now the young salmon that survive the hazards of the sea, the net, and the lure may return to these same hatchery ponds in which they were reared. Their liberation is still a loss to the Oregon State Game Commission, for they were slated for stocking in other coastal streams which lack a silver salmon run.

An additional loss was the liberation of 2,000 cutthroat trout in Ferry creek. These trout were being held as brood stock from which cutthroat eggs could be obtained.

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## Ore. Elk Hunters Fail to Report

To date, less than half of the hunters who purchased elk tags in Oregon for last season have mailed in their hunting reports to the Game Commission, it was announced today by C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game director. Lockwood pointed out that these reports are required by law and are also of vital necessity for the proper management of our big game herds.

Of the 16,980 elk hunters reporting so far, 7,257 have reported making kills, and 9,104 reported they were unsuccessful. The remaining 619 reported they did not hunt.

Lockwood stated that the late season in the Baker area running until December 31, probably had some bearing on the lack of report. He urged all deer and elk hunters who have not reported as yet to mail their reports at once.

If the return card has been lost or mislaid, a letter will do. The letter should be addressed to the Oregon State Game Commission in Portland and should include the following information: if a hunt was made or not, if a kill was made or not, if a kill was made the approximate location of the kill and the approximate age of the kill.

This is one way that all hunters can help to maintain hunting in Oregon, Lockwood stressed.

## Tentative Angling Rules Set Jan. 14

(Continued from last issue)

### Winter Regulations for Steelhead and Salmon in Inland Waters

(Zones 2, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9)

OPEN SEASON AND OPEN AREAS: October 16 to April 30, inclusive for salmon and steelhead 20 inches or over in length, in all waters of Zones 2, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, except those closed to angling or having special seasons as listed by zones.

March 1 to April 14, inclusive, for salmon and steelhead 15 inches or over in length, in the Willamette river from its mouth to Oregon City falls.

BAG LIMIT: 2 steelhead and salmon in the aggregate in any one day but not more than 4 such fish in the aggregate in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time. Not more than 20, in the aggregate of salmon and steelhead 20 inches or over in length may be taken in any one calendar year. (See regulation regarding steelhead and salmon punch card.)

### Striped Bass, Shad, Sturgeon, Bullfrogs, and Spiny-Rayed Fish

STRIPED BASS: Open season entire year. Bag limit 5 per day. No bag limit.

SHAD: Open season entire year. No bag limit.

STURGEON: Open season entire year except that season is closed in the Umpqua river and tributaries. Minimum length limit is 30 inches and maximum length limit is 72 inches. Bag limit: Not more than 3 sturgeon 30 to 47 inches in length and not more than 2 sturgeon 48 to 72 inches in length.

BULLFROGS: Open season entire year. Bag limit: 12 in possession at any one time. Bullfrogs must be not less than 4 inches in body length and can be caught only by hook and line.

SPINY-RAYED FISH: Open season entire year for sunfish, perch, crappies, catfish, and black bass. Bag limits: No limit on perch. For other species of spiny-rayed fish, 30 fish or 20 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 30 fish of all species combined in possession at any one time.

### EXCEPTIONS TO SPINY-RAY REGULATIONS:

OSWEGO LAKE: Open season, April 15 to October 15, inclusive. Bag limit: 30 spiny-rayed fish or 20 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 30 fish of all species combined in possession at any one time of which not more than 6 may be black bass.

LAKE OF THE WOODS (Klamath County): Open season, entire year and no bag limit for spiny-rayed fish.

FERN RIDGE RESERVOIR (Lane county): March 7 to September 15, inclusive.

LONG TOM RIVER from Fern Ridge dam to second bridge about 1/2 mile below: Open season, April 15 to October 15, inclusive.

NIGHT ANGLING: Catfish may be caught or angled for during the open seasons therefor at any hour of the day or night, except in the waters of the Rogue river and its tributaries.

### Salmon and Steelhead Permit

A free salmon and steelhead permit is to be used by Oregon anglers beginning March 1, 1950, and extending to February 28, 1951.

Twenty salmon and steelhead in the aggregate are allowed each fisherman for the permit year. Each time a fish is caught a punch is removed from the card, and the date and river are entered in the space provided at the time the fish is taken. The permits will be available at all game commission, license agencies on or about February 25, 1950. Permits are to be retained by all anglers until May 31, 1951, in order that the Game Commission may obtain a sample for a study of the catch. Specific letters are to be sent to individual anglers requesting the return of the permits.

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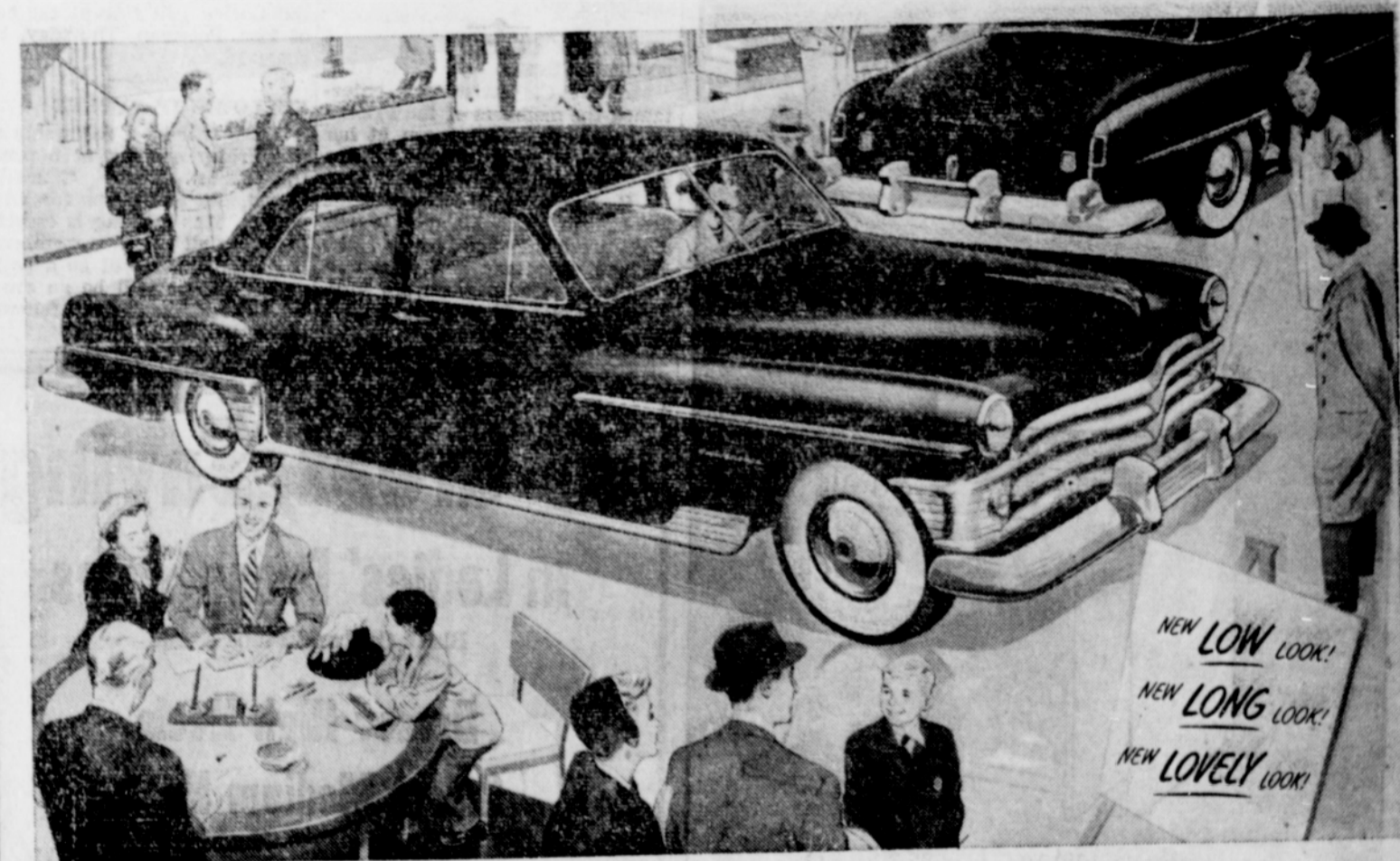
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
