BARTON REAPPOINTED

Melvin L. Murphy, executive director of the Mental Association of Oregon, announced today the reappointment of Harold Barton of Eugene, as field secretary for the association.

In the next few months Mr. Barton, with headquarters in Eugene (Route 2, Box 326) will work closely with the members of the chapters of the Association in Lane Benton and Linn Counties; Dr. Paul Eisner, Dr. O. R. Chambers and Mr. C. H. Cleaver are presidents of the respective chapters.

The local units, formed a year ago under Mr. Barton's leadership are particularly interested in furthering the general education objectives of the organization and in surveying community mental health needs and resources. A number of visits by citizen groups to state mental institutions are being planned, and voluntary donations of educational and recreation material for use by patients is stressed. Eugene and Corvallis have already collected large quantities of reading material, games and sewing supplies for the state hospital in Salem.

Now you Know!

QUESTION: I sometimes lend my car to my sister who is an adult and licensed to drive. A friend tells me that if she should have an accident I would be responsible as the owner of the car and that my liability and property damage insurance would not protect me. It seems to me I am protected but I'm not sure and I would appreciate it if you would clear this up for me.

ANSWER: Your liability and property damage policy covers you and any other legally responsible person who has your permission to drive the car. So long as you personally lend the car to your sister you are fully protected in any possible resulting accident.
