Advisory Council To Hold Meeting On February 3rd

Oregon's 10-member Advisory Council on Employment, recently appointed by Governor Douglas McKay, will hold its first meeting at the capitol Friday afternoon, February 3.

Problems of developing more jobs not only to relieve increasing seasonal unemployment but also on a long range basis for full development of the state's resources will be studied by the representative group headed by Dr. Calvin Crumbaker of the University of Oregon department of economics.

While the national, coastal and state-wide aspects of employment programs will be presented by speakers at the first session, special emphasis will be laid on community organizations to promote more jobs. Preliminary surveys of local office areas will be available from the State Unemployment Compensation Commission, and plans are being made to gather data to be used by community councils organized through the state-wide group. Chairman Crumbaker is expected to develop this program in detail for consideration of the State Advisory council.

Other speakers at the opening session include Governor McKay, who will give the council's objectives; T. Morris Dunne, chairman of the unemployment commission and member of the Interstate Conference Committee for employment development; Dewey Coats, representing the Bureau of Employment Security and U. S. Department of Labor; Glenn E. Brockway, B. E. S. regional representative; Silas Gaiser, S.U.C.C. administrator; and Virgil L. Sexton, supervisor of research and statistics.

Members of the council are: (Public) Jack Jennings of Portland labor-management committee Milan Smith of Pendleton, and David Blakeman of Portland; (Labor) M. E. Steele and George Brown of Portland, and Mrs. Alice Bissell of Eugene; (Management) J. C. Compton of McMinneville, Andrew Collier of Klamath Falls and Elmer R. Goudy of Portland.

New Movie on Filberts to Be Shown in East

Three governmental groups at Washington, D. C., whose decisions have broad bearing on the economic interests of Pacific Northwest filbert growers, have seen advance showing of "The Filbert Valleys," new color and sound movie produced by Northwest Nut Growers, Dundee, Oregon. It is a pictorial story of filbert growing and marketing.

Oregon and Washington senators and congressmen, prominent department of agriculture officials and members of the U. S. Tariff commission viewed separate showings of the film, and were all highly impressed both by the movie and the evidence it gave of the scope of the industry.

John E. Trunk, general manager of Northwest Nut Growers, and Roy A. Ward, chairman of the advertising committee of the association, took the filbert movie east for the special showings. Trunk also spoke on filberts before members of the tariff commission.

Douglas Fir

The Douglas fir is named in honor of David Douglas, a Scottish botanist who introduced it into Europe in 1827. The first report of Douglas fir was made by Archibald Menzies in 1792 at Nootka Sound, Vancouver Island, during the voyage of Captain Vancouver. It was the first species cut and exported from the Columbia river region by the Hudson's Bay Trading post at Vancouver, Washington.

180 Trees in Road To Champion Mine

If you are planning on going up into the Bohemia country, it would be advisable to wait awhile. The forest service at Rujada reported Monday that there were 180 trees on the road from the Champion bridge and Weaver creek. Martin Robinson and LeRoy Berry found this condition when they went up to the Champion snow course to check the snow. They found ten feet of snow at the Champion and will return February 1 to again measure the snow.

In a 24-hour period ending Monday morning, a total of 1.12 inches of rain fell at the Rujada station.

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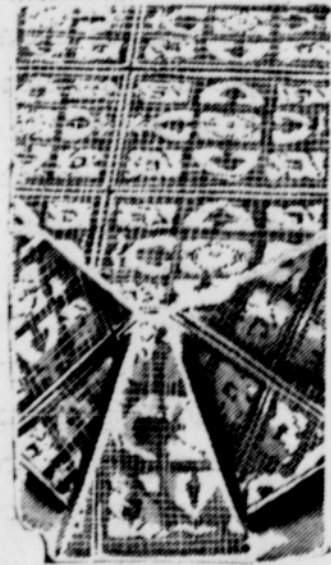
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
