Lion Basketeers Drop 47-39 Game To St. Marys 26th

The Grove Lions cage squad lost their first game in eight starts last Thursday evening at the Eugene armory when they met defeat at the hands of the St. Mary's Gaels 47-39. The Gael victory was credited to the fact that the Eugene lads employed a full court defense on an oversized court, but not until the final quarter. Thursday evening's result evened the score between the two teams as the Lions previously defeated the Gaels 36-33 on the local court about a month ago.

Cottage Grove led up until late in the second quarter, although the lead was never substantial. At the end of the first quarter the Lions held a 9-6 lead and later enjoyed an 11-6 bulge in the scoring before losing the lead 14-13 near the half time.

The third quarter was a scoring duel between Bob Cook and Ronny Olson of the Gaels, with the lead changing back and forth several times. Olson bagged 17 points in the half to 15 points for Cook. The latter was bottled up by the tight Gaels defense, moving to the sides and corners for effective work in the third quarter.

Krasneski garnered 11 points for the Gaels to emerge as second high man of the game while Hilliker gathered ten points for the Lions.

Orlena Martin's 154 and June Carnes' 404 helped their McKenzie Texaco team take a 2-1 decision from the Women of the Moose.

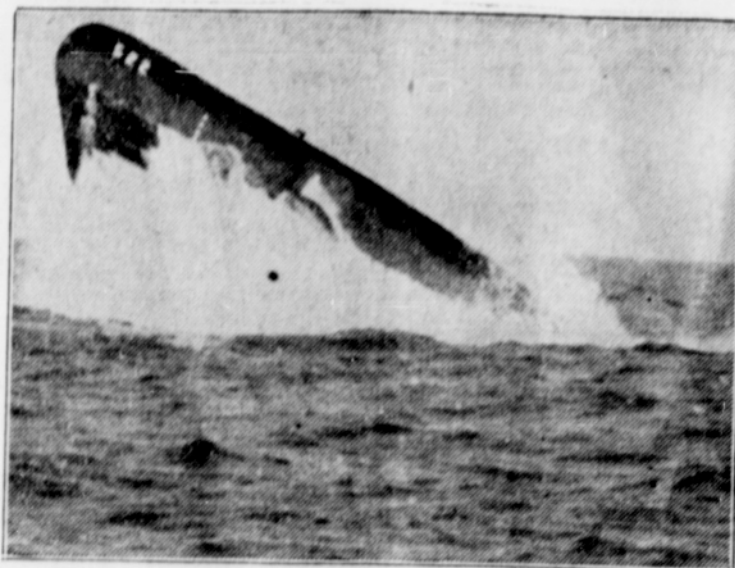

EUGENE READY FOR TENNIS MATCH
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 1 — McArthur court's spacious basketball facilities will lend themselves nicely to tennis and will rank as one of the better locations played this year by Jack Kramer, Pancho Gonzales, Frank Parker and Pancho Segura.

That was the opinion Tuesday of Mrs. Kay Riggs, wife of Bobby Riggs, the top man in the professional tennis field today. Mrs. Riggs, who acts as "advance man" for the star-studded cast of tennis experts, said the pros play such a fast game that 128 feet was needed to offer the players full opportunity to maneuver and in many places that much room was simply not available.

The pert, blonde Mrs. Riggs also was pleased with the lighting in the "Iglloo". "Many places where we play are rather dark and it makes it hard on both the players and the spectators. I am sure that these lights will be more than adequate to assure all concerned good visibility."

The pros have developed a full-court canvas layout which is the most modern of all indoor playing courts. It is a bright green in color and the court lines have been painted on the surface.

Angling Regulations Made Final at Meet January 28th

The Oregon State Game Commission meeting January 28 adopted final angling regulations for 1950.

The greatest change from the tentative angling regulations which were announced two weeks ago was the changing of the opening date in Zone 3 and in the southern half of Zone 2. The new opening date for Zone 3 and for the North Santiam river and its tributaries and all the waters of Lion and Lane counties in Zone 2 will be May 1. This action was taken to protect spawning fish in some of the major streams and to equalize opening day fishing pressures.

Other changes from the tentative regulations are as follows: In Zone 1 the opening for salmon fishing in the Nehalem river, Salmonberry river, North Fork of the Salmonberry river, Rock creek, Wilson river, Trask river, and the North Fork of the Trask river will be October 1, instead of October 15 as previously announced. These are streams that are closed to summer fishing for salmon, and the two week early opening is to allow fall fishing before the general high waters. Also in Zone 1 the closing date for winter fishing on the Nestucca river was set as February 28 to conform with other coastal streams. The bag limit on catfish in Tenmile lake, Zone 1, was eliminated as the lake is overpopulated with this species. The only other changes in Zone 1 were the moving upstream of the deadline for winter fishing on the Tillamook river up to the confluence of Munson creek, and the changing of the deadline on the Nehalem river from the CCC bridge upstream to a marker at the narrows.

In Zone 2 an open season was set for Lost lake in Linn county, June 1 to June 30, inclusive. Also in Zone 2 the season for Gold lake was set June 1 to July 10, inclusive. This changing of the opening date makes it conform with the opening dates of similar lakes in the area. The only other change in Zone 2 is the closing to salmon fishing of Herman creek up to highway bridge 30 and the Columbia river within a one-fourth mile radius of Herman creek from August 15 to October 20. This was set to protect the operations of the salmon hatchery of the Fish Commission.

In Zone 4 the ban on night catfishing in the waters of the Rogue river and its tributaries was eliminated. This now conforms with the general regulations for the rest of the state. A change was also made in the steelhead and salmon bag limit in Zone 4. It now reads two fish per day, not more than five per week, and not more than twenty per year provided that not more than ten can be taken before August 15. This regulation is designed to give some protection to the spring run of chinook salmon that has been rapidly declining.

In Zone 5, Little Lava lake was removed from the closed to all angling list. The opening of Rock creek reservoir was set at May 1 to conform with other waters in the area. The opening dates for Fawn, Wahoo, and Rosary lakes were set at June 1 instead of June 10. This makes the date the same as that applying to similar lakes in that area. The season for North Twin lakes will be May 1 to September 15, inclusive, and for Wickiup reservoir will be May 1 to September 30, inclusive.

Complete compilation of the angling regulations will be published in the February issue of the Oregon State Game Commission Bulletin. The Oregon Angler's Guide, which is the official synopsis of regulations, should be ready for distribution by the middle of March.

Battling Ducks to Face Tough Game In North Division

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 1 — Oregon's battling Ducks, fresh from a pair of upset wins over the Washington Huskies, now face the toughest nine days of the 1950 Northern Division season.

The Webfoots left Eugene Wednesday evening for Moscow and Pullman for the annual invasion of the Inland Empire. Oregon tackles Idaho on Friday and Saturday and then moves against Washington State on Monday and Tuesday. The Ducks then travel home to face Oregon State at McArthur court on February 10 and complete the nine-day marathon on February 11 with a non-conference game with St. Mary's College.

The five conference games in eight days will settle the fate of the slim championship hopes still held by the Ducks. Coach John Warren's gang must win four of the five games to keep themselves in contention with Washington, Washington State and Oregon State.

The Oregon stock rose rapidly with the sensational play of Jack Keller since he earned a starting berth at guard. Keller opened the second Washington game in Seattle and scored 15 points and played 40 minutes. He repeated the "iron-man" stunt in both Husky games at McArthur court and added 16 and 18 points to his rapidly rising total for the season.

Oregon's pesky center problem also appeared near solution. Jim Vranizan, the sophomore who broke into the lineup at the turn of the year, is now getting considerable help from Bob Amacher and Mel Streeter. Amacher's backboard play stemmed a Washington rally in the first game last week end and Streeter's seven points and board play was a big factor in the second win over the Huskies.

After a month of adjusting to a back brace, Paul Sowers seems well on the way to the fine season predicted for him before the year opened. The sharpshooting Duck veteran now leads the Oregon league scoring with 78 points and his shooting average from the field is well above 33%.

Coach Warren hopes that Sowers and Keller will get help in the scoring from Will Urban on the trip north. Urban has slumped in his shooting in the last three weeks and seems due for a reversal of form. However, Urban continues to be one of the better rebounders in the league and will aid the Ducks, regardless of his shooting problems.

An even dozen Ducks will make the trip to play Idaho and Washington State. Coach Warren probably will bank on Sowers, Urban, Dale Warberg and Lynn Hamilton as forwards, Vranizan, Amacher and Streeter as centers, and Keller, Mel Krause, Bob Lavey, Ken Hunt and Johnny Neeley as guards.

Diet for Pig Deaths

Faulty nutrition of sows and gilts has been over-rated as a cause of baby pig deaths, in the opinion of a Minnesota research veterinarian. Dr. George A. Young, Jr., of the Hormel foundation at Austin, Minn., says unidentified virus diseases and other infectious conditions are more often the major cause of fatal pig ailments than errors in feeding and management.

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GAME AGENT CHECKS DEER ON TILLAMOOK BURN

A search for pocketed deer herds in the Tillamook burn area by plane was carried out Monday. Jim Negley, district game agent for the Oregon State Game Commission, flying with Bob Earl of McMinnville, spent part of the day over the burn from Cherry Grove to Willamina. It had been feared that herds of deer might be pocketed in high canyons by the recent heavy snows. The search, however, revealed that the deer were well scattered in the lower

canyons and along the timber and brush fringe areas. No deer were found at the higher levels.

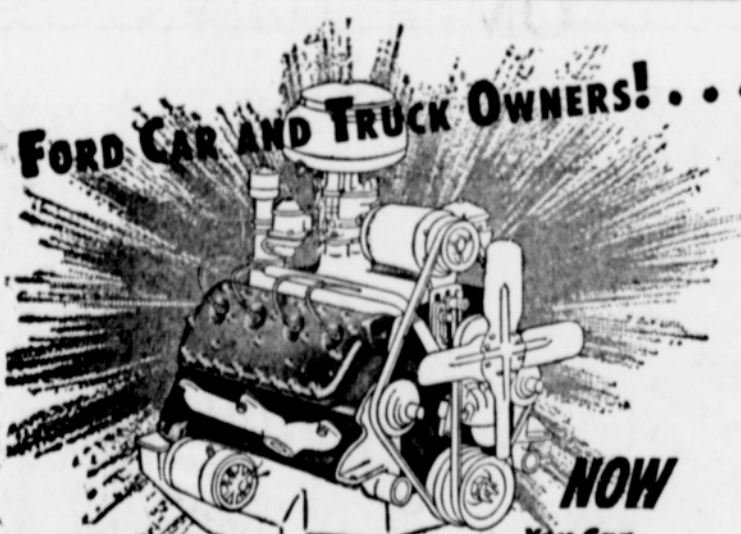
