Fellowship Group Organized at First Baptist Church

A Baptist fellowship group was organized Tuesday evening at the First Baptist church when forty-five men braved zero weather to attend the initial meeting and to hear Dr. Victor Sword, returned missionary from India as guest speaker.

According to Dr. Sword, the challenging thing today in the Orient is where will the four hundred and fifty million people of India cast their lot, with communism or with Christianity. Already with China under the domination of Russia and possibly part of Japan the communists have about an eight to one advantage. At the present time Dr. Sword is advisor to the Assam government. He knows Nehru, the present Indian prime minister and was acquainted with Gandhi, in fact he visited with the late Gandhi several times and found him a man of very simple tastes. He gave a brief background of India in his subject, "Gandhi, Nehru and Christ," and told of his association with the two Indian leaders.

There are over 1,000 Indian students in the United States' colleges and universities according to Dr. Sword, who is serving as advisor to the students in this country. It is vitally important that these students get a correct impression of the workings of democracy, if the 450 million people are to be saved from communism, he said.

At the conclusion of Dr. Sword's address, a business meeting and question and answer period was held. The group voted to leave the matter of naming officers up to the planning committee and to hold a general meeting probably once per month. At the suggestion of Chas. Parrett the group also agreed to ask for the Jefferson gym one night per week to engage in some sort of athletics.

E. L. Clark served as toastmaster of the meeting Tuesday.

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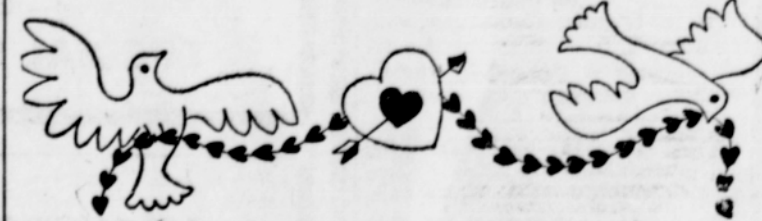


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
