Historic Barn Falls

The historic old barn on the Barney Doyle place west of town collapsed during the recent heavy snowstorm. The barn was constructed in 1860-61 and the hand hewn timbers were secured with wooden pins. It contained one of the few remaining threshing floors in the country. This threshing floor consisted of a series of long boards alternating with short ones with slits from one and a half to three inches in length. Horses were driven in on the grain and the wheat would thus be shaken through the cracks onto the canvas.

Orders for 3,100 new freight cars have been placed by Southern Pacific, according to announcement by A. T. Mercier, president of the railroad.

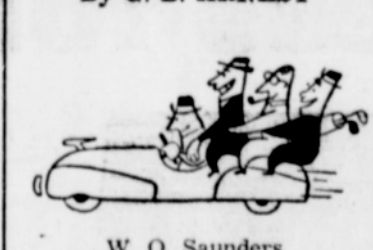

QUESTION: If I drive a borrowed car, am I covered by the public liability and property damages insurance I carry on my own car? One of those complicated transportation problems involving getting four men to the golf course but leaving enough cars so their wives could do the shopping came up the other day and someone mentioned the insurance angle.

ANSWER: So long as the borrowed car is a private passenger vehicle which you do not regularly drive, you are fully covered by your own insurance policy. It should be mentioned, however that the policy does not extend to cars which you actually own besides the one insured. You must arrange for separate insurance on each such car.
