Top Flight Tennis Makes Debut Feb. 8th at Eugene

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, February 10—Top flight tennis was a definite success in its debut in McArthur court Wednesday evening. More than 4,000 fans watched the touring Bobby Riggs group play a series of three matches and the results exceeded even the fondest expectations.

Jack Kramer and Pancho Segura shared the spotlight. Kramer, the world's professional champion outblasted Pancho Gonzales, 6-3 and 6-3, to win the feature match. Segura, the colorful South American, outstroked Frankie Parker, 8-7 and 7-5, in a brilliant exhibition of tennis stroking and strategy.

In the doubles Kramer and Parker won the single set match from Gonzales and Segura, 7-5. The two Panchos captured the sympathy of the crowd with their colorful style of play, but they couldn't match the power of the winners.

The manner in which Kramer defeated Gonzales left the crowd gasping. The big champion had a blistering service and his ground game forced Gonzales into frequent errors.

Another feature of the exhibition which proved popular was the dis-

tribution of orchids to all the feminine fans who held reserved seat tickets. The flowers were furnished by Vince Farina, sports minded operator of Flowers Unlimited in Eugene.

McArthur Court proved more than ample for the playing floor brought along by the tennis stars. All of them were of the opinion that both the lighting and other facilities of the "Iglloo" made it ideal for indoor tennis.

WILDLIFE EXAMS SCHEDULED

The Oregon State Game Commission announced today that all Game Biologist I and all Aquatic Biologist I positions for the Game commission will be filled from the registers of the state civil service commission. Open competitive examinations for these registers will be held March 18, 1950.

Applications may be obtained from the state civil service commission in Salem or any office of the state employment service. The application must be submitted to the civil service commission by midnight, March 4, 1950.

The applicant must be a college graduate with a major in fisheries or game management, or he must have an equivalent combination of experience and training. Oregon residence is not required, but the applicant must be a United States citizen. Veterans will be given a five point preference on their examination.

Steelhead Runs Have Begun Again

Migration of winter steelhead, halted for more than two months by cold weather, resumed with a rush Friday 8th, Rose Newcomb, resident biologist with the state game department reported at Roseburg. Newcomb counted 488 steelheads through the Winchester station during the 14 hours Feb. 8. Only 76 fish passed over the board between 6 and 10 p.m.

Studies have proven that the fish do not move when water temperature drops to 40 degrees. Since mid-December water temperature has held under 40 degrees and, during the recently extremely cold weather went as low as 31 degrees.

Temperature rose to 40 degrees Tuesday and 48 fish went through the counting station. With water temperatures of 41 to 42 degrees Wednesday, the migration furnished counters with a busy day as they tallied 488 fish.

Newcomb reports that recent activities of the department include planting 384,354 fall chinook salmon fry in the Umpqua system. The eggs were hatched at the Rock Creek station. Half were released above the Winchester dam and the remainder below the dam. The fish were scattered from Lone Rock to Cleveland rapids.

Lowell Radway led the Cubs in scoring with 11 points. The next home game will be Friday, February 24.

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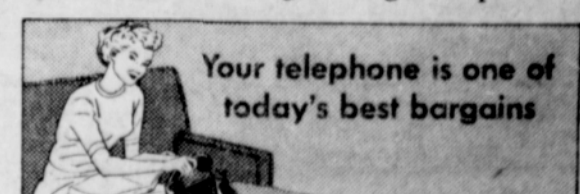


Answering promptly—giving others a full minute to answer her call—are first on Janie's list of aids to service.
