- 1 cup Fisher's Blend Flour, not sifted
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening, margarine or butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 cups Zoom
- 1/2 cup raisins or dates
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1/2 cup plus 2 tbs. milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Have shortening at room temperature. Put all ingredients in mixing bowl and beat 3 minutes at medium speed electric mixer, or by hand until well-mixed. Drop from teaspoon onto well-greased baking sheet. Bake at 400° F. 12 to 15 minutes.
