Kingsley Explains Cafeteria Changes Required For Federal Subsidy, Foods

Our cafeteria along with almost all school cafeterias of the state is government subsidized. A state inspector has recently pointed out irregularities to us that must be corrected if we are to continue to receive government funds and surplus foods. It would be impossible for us to serve a meal of the quality we have, and for the low price that we have, without this government aid.

The two main points of correction are that milk has to be served with each meal and that chocolate milk is not to be substituted. The second point is that a plate lunch without choice of foods must be served. In other words our Home Economics department and the cooks must work out balanced meals that you may buy at the low set price of 25c. We ask the cooperation of our students in this program, and we will endeavor to do our best to continue serving you good wholesome meals at a nominal cost of 25c.

Special arrangements have been



made so milk and ice cream can be purchased by those who bring their lunch from home, or by anyone who wishes these extras with their cafeteria lunch.
