Birth Rate Up; Food Supply Less

WASHINGTON — The world's food supply is becoming less adequate for an increasing and always underfed population.

Before the war 22 per cent of the population received a submarginal supply of 2000 calories a day or less. Now that underfed proportion has risen to 35 per cent.

In 1939 50 per cent of the world's population received the barely adequate supply of 2240 calories a day. Now this same proportion has dropped just below adequacy—to 2100 calories or less.

It is certain that 80 per cent of the entire world's population is getting less protein than before the war.

Since 1945 the world's food supplies, in terms of calories, have risen by 1 per cent. The population has risen 8 per cent.

These are figures announced here by Sir Herbert Broadley, deputy director general of the food and agriculture organization of the United Nations, whose headquarters are in Washington.

Assuming that the present population trend will remain the same, as is almost certain to be the case, the prospects become somewhat alarming, according to the organization's forecasts.

Even ten years from now the food-increase figures — providing for barely adequate nutrition for the estimated future population — are astronomical. The requirements call for an extra 60,000,000 tons of cereals, 30,000,000 tons of meat, 250,000,000 tons of fruits and vegetables and 35,000,000 gallons of milk.

None of these figures is necessarily correct to within the nearest million. Sir Herbert Broadley said, but they give a clear picture of the troubles ahead.

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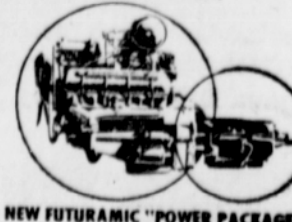
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
