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Brotherhood House Observes Brotherhood Week

Exemplifying the spirit of racial, interfaith, cooperative living center sponsored by the Northern Baptist Convention for college students and graduates either going to school or working in Denver. Fourteen young people now residing at Brotherhood House represent the Jewish, Protestant and Roman Catholic faiths, and are Caucasian (white), Chinese, Japanese and Negro Americans. There is no quota system for accepting residents, but take who ever comes solely on the basis of character qualifications.

The religious faiths of the young people in the picture include Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and Buddhist.

Brotherhood House is inter-

gram of community outreach which includes teenage, college-age young couples and adult fellowship groups. At a recent inter-cultural tea at the First Baptist church, Denver, the secretary of the Denver Unity Council after having presented representatives of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the Anti-Defamation League, the Urban League, Japanese-American Citizens' League and a Spanish-American representative, introduced Brotherhood as "the organization which will eventually remove the necessity for the other organizations existing."
