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Let's Sing America Requests Should Be in March 2nd

University of Oregon, Eugene, February 20 (Special)—Requests for songs to be sung on the Big Broadcast of "Let's Sing, America" in April must be in the hands of Miss Maude Garnett by March 2.

Miss Garnett, associate professor of public school music and director of the popular KOAC program, asks that children from each school submit a list of 15 songs from the American Singer Book for Combined Grades. The list should have five songs from each of three divisions—patriotic songs, folk songs, and composed songs (such as Brahms' lullaby).

Requests for songs not in the songbook may be made, if the songs are popular and widely known. The chosen list will be mimeographed and distributed to the school children. Starting March 16 the songs will be rehearsed over the air at the regular broadcast time on Thursday at 1:15 p.m.

The Big Broadcast, to which children from schools all over the state come, will be on April 20.

New OSC Booklet On Oregon Trees Proving Popular

Oregon State College—An 80-page illustrated booklet on "Trees to Know in Oregon" that already promises to become one of the most popular and widely distributed publications by Oregon State College has just been published cooperatively by the O.S.C. extension service and the Oregon state board of forestry.

The booklet was written primarily for boys and girls of Oregon, and especially to serve leaders and members of 4-H forestry clubs, but other young people and grown-ups as well are expected to be interested in it. The bulletin is No. 907.

Written by Charles R. Ross, O.S.C. extension service farm forestry specialist, the booklet contains more than a hundred drawings and illustrations by Hugh Hayes, civil engineer for the Oregon state board of forestry.

"Every citizen of this state has a vital economic interest in the welfare of Oregon's great forest resources," the introduction says. "Every Oregonian—farmer, laborer, business man, civil servant, housewife, and schoolboy—can well afford to take a longer and more appreciative look at the trees around him."

"Trees to Know in Oregon" will give Oregonians that look, for it describes in simple, easy understandable language the characteristics of trees found in Oregon's woods and forests. Illustrations show how to identify the different trees and easily-read maps indicate areas of the state where they grow.

The introduction points to the increasing number of farmers adding woodland crops to their other farming enterprises, improved uses through research for forest products, and forest conservation as accomplished in recent years. But it adds that much remains to be done and that this book will enable everyone to become better acquainted with Oregon trees in a more personal way.

Special sections are devoted to introduced trees, Oregon forest facts, the farm forest and the Keep Oregon Green program, which joined in providing funds for publication of the booklet.

Copies are available without charge from county extension offices or from the college directly.

ERADICATION OF RABIES PLANNED BY U. N. AGENCY

GENEVA—Plans for the introduction of new rabies control methods and the eventual elimination of the frequently fatal disease have been announced here by the World Health Organization (WHO), a United Nations Specialized Agency.

WHO will convene an expert committee on rabies next April to study the situation and initiate research into protective measures. Meanwhile, extensive field demonstrations of rabies control will be conducted in Egypt and Israel with a new concentrated serum, and tried experimentally in the USA on animals. The serum gives promise of preventing a large proportion of human rabies. It is anticipated that some 400 persons will be treated during the first experiment, to start in mid-1950 and end in 1952.

In Israel, the WHO-sponsored project calls for the eradication of rabies from small test areas thru inoculation of all dogs with a newly-developed vaccine. With the vaccines now in use, rabies prophylaxis requires annual re-vaccination, which makes thorough eradication of the disease almost impossible.
