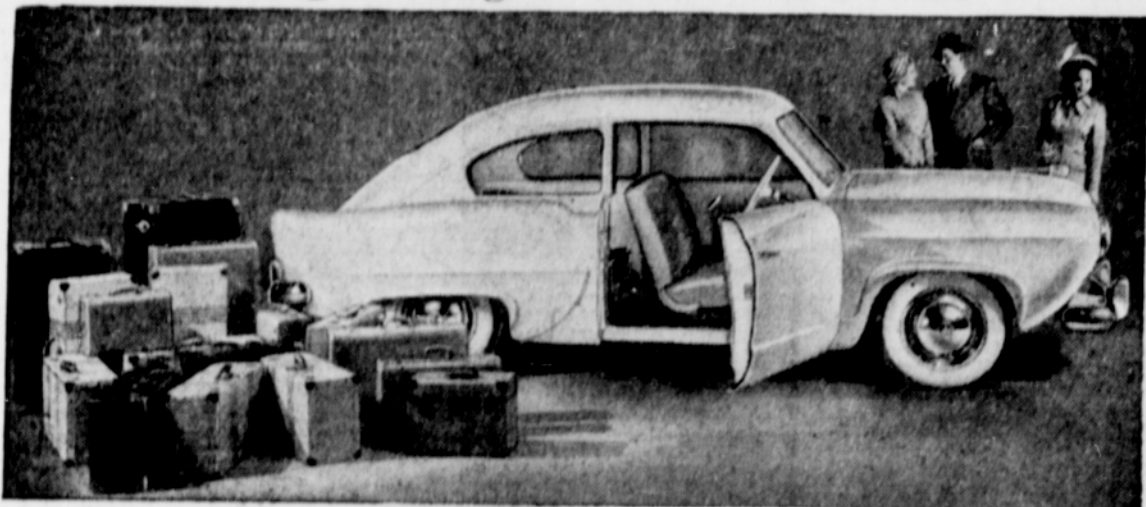

NEW DRUG FOR ALCOHOLICS

Washington, D.C.—A cure for alcoholism may rest in a new drug which causes alcoholics to lose their desire for drinking.

The possibilities of using the drug Antabuse is discussed by Dr. Harold C. Tooker, of New York, in an article appearing in the February issue of Life and Health, published in Takoma Park, Washington, D. C. Not as yet considered a cure, recent clinical tests indicate that this drug, Antabuse (tetraethylthiuram disulfide), may be the answer to the problem of the chronic alcoholic.

The use of the drug in cases of this type was discovered by Dr. Erik Jacobsen and Dr. O. Martensen-Larsen, of Copenhagen, Denmark. Their treatment with Antabuse indicates a possible cure.

When taken in prescribed doses Antabuse has few undesirable effects on the human body. But when a person under treatment takes any alcoholic beverage the drink becomes "very undesirable." Patients, urged by the doctors to take a sample drink, tried one and then two—but the third was left untouched. One important advantage of Antabuse is that several weeks after treatment is discontinued the drug is still effective.

Just how long a complete cure will take is not, at present, known; neither is the time when treatments will be generally available. So far statistics show that patients have an 85 per cent chance of remaining sober after six months of treatment.

Big Fertilizer Increase Shown On Oregon Farms

Oregon farmers are spending more and more money for fertilizer.

Use of commercial fertilizer has increased more than five times in the state during the past 10 years, says Arthur S. King, Oregon State college extension soil conservation specialist, who adds that the rapid increase in commercial fertilizer use appears likely to continue if farmers are to hold their own against plant food losses.

He points to a report by the Production and Marketing Administration which states that Oregon farmers used slightly less than 4,000 tons of commercial plant food annually as recently as 1939. During a 12-month period ending in July, 1948, more than 20,000 tons were spread.

King emphasizes that these figures indicate actual amounts of plant food—nitrogen, phosphorus, potash. Since commercial fertilizer contains a considerable percentage of inert material, the specialist estimates Oregon's annual fertilizer purchases at upwards of 100,000 tons annually. Lime and landplaster are not included.

Field crops—seed, grain, pasture, and hay—account for the greatest increase in fertilizer use. Oregon farmers now use more fertilizer for these field crops than any other western state. Increased use rates, however, on intensively cultivated crops have also added to the total tonnage figure.

In 1939, King says, commercial fertilizers were providing only one and one-half pounds of plant food per Oregon crop land acre. Ten years later, increased use was providing eight pounds. Despite this increase, King declares that it is scarcely enough now to keep up with natural plant food losses by leaching under good farming conditions. It represents only a minute fraction of the plant food removed by crops harvested each year.

Thus, King predicts that much greater use will be made of commercial fertilizers in the future as Oregon farmers find it necessary to recoup soil fertility losses.

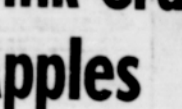
