

Drain Wins Douglas County B Cage Title in Thrill Packed Game at Yoncalla

Drain has again won the Douglas county "B" basketball title in a close contest with Glendale and is expected to repeat the trip to the district finals. The thrill packed game was played in the new Yoncalla gym Saturday night. Drain battled from behind to overtake Glendale and win the Douglas county crown 28 to 24.

Oakland maintained a steady lead to beat Days Creek, 41-17, for consolation honors.

Both Drain and Glendale will represent Douglas county in the district B league finals to be held at Yoncalla March 3-4. In Friday night games, Drain will meet Gold Beach, Curry county champs, at 7:30 p.m. Glendale and Powers, champions of Coos county, will meet in the evening's finale. Saturday night, the two winners play for the right to enter the state B finals at Astoria the following week and the two losers play for the consolation award.

Although Drain was cited by most experts to repeat its trip to the district finals for the third straight year, Glendale's big band

of Pirates nearly upset the dopest by dominating first half play.

Local Team Wins State Moose Bowling Tourney at Eugene

Local bowling enthusiasts will be pleased to learn that Cottage Grove was well represented in the state Moose bowling championships held at the Eugene Recreation alleys over the past two weeks.

After the final ball had been rolled by the last man of the forty teams entered, the results showed two local teams placing in the first five for the entire state. Kelly's Market finished as the undisputed state champions for 1950 with a score of 3053. One of the other top home teams, the Grove Tavern, wound up in fourth position with 3026.

In the doubles event two Grove Tavern keglers, Ray Johnston and Joe Olds, walked away with fifth place honors with 1238 and Ray placed well up in the money in the singles with a score of 670, only 20 pins behind the leader.

It is particularly noteworthy that Kelly's Market defeated an aggregation of 40 of the best Moose lodge teams in Oregon including entries from Portland, Salem, Klamath Falls, Corvallis, Albany, Eugene and many other

cities. To win, Kelly's Market rolled an impressive score just 40 pins below the highest score ever recorded in this six year old tournament. They might have set a new all time high score had not the old bugaboo of splits and tournament litters overtaken the boys in the last game. Having amassed a total of 2167 in the first two games they fell to a heart-breaking 889 in the last game; a game in which the team suffered thru a total of 14 splits and a low score of 107 by the team captain Harvey Kelly. (Poor Harvey). We have been informed that he received a very special trophy for this outstanding achievement. We also understand that he has difficulty finding a friend to talk to around the market, particularly since his employee Lee "Butch" Harrison, who ordinarily has trouble hitting his hat with both hands, ran amok with a series of 573. Darrell Eastburn was high singles with 222.

The Cottage Grove team lost the first encounter with the Eugene high quintet at the district tournament underway at McArthur court Tuesday night 47-31. The results were not particularly surprising as Eugene has led the district throughout the season. In the first game St. Mary's downed Wilamette high in a nip and tuck battle 37-34. Tonight (Thursday) the Lions will meet St. Mary's and tomorrow night will play Wilamette.

The Grovers won the final home game here Friday evening, defeating the Springfield Millers 31-26. This was the second straight defeat for the Millers at the hands of the Lions, who won the first encounter 45-33.

Friday night's win enabled the Grovers to finish in a tie for first place in district 2. However the Lions lost on the flip of the coin, which put the Will Hi team in the number one spot in the district tourney which started at the McArthur court Tuesday evening at Eugene. Will Hi met St. Mary's in the first game Tuesday night while the Lions drew the toughest opposition of the tournament, Eugene high. The Grovers will participate in the playoff Thursday and Friday.

Friday night's game was more or less of a nip and tuck affair with the Grovers never enjoying more than a six point lead. Lowry Hoyer started the fire works in the first quarter by timely baskets and the quarter ended with the Lions on the long end of an 11-5 score. Hoyer and Felkner of Springfield traded baskets in the second quarter which was more or less of a stalemate affair. The Lions led at the intermission 17-11. The third quarter saw the Lions jump into a 27-17 lead with Hoyer, Wolfard and Malcolm all scoring points. The fourth quarter saw the Lions hold onto their slim lead. Hoyer made 12 points to lead his team mates and Felkner was the leading scorer for the visitors with 7.
