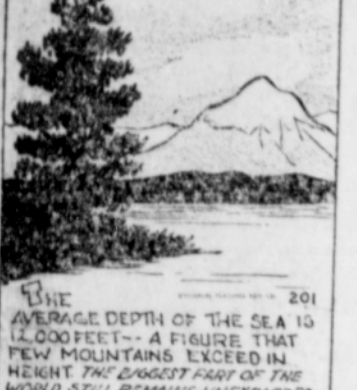

## 76 Candidates in Douglas Co. File

Seventy six candidates had filed for office in Douglas county at the deadline Friday, March 10th, Roy Agee, county clerk announced at Roseburg Saturday. However filings will be considered by mail if the letter bearing the filing bears a March 10th date line.

Three candidates had filed on the 10th for county judge. Carl C. Hill and C. W. (Turk) Manning had filed as republican candidates and Howard E. Cracraft as a democrat. For county commissioner, Lynn V. Beckley, incumbent; A. O. "Hap" Helvey, Guy McGee, republicans and R. D. "Dick" Williams, as a democrat.

For county assessor: Ned Dixon, incumbent, republican and J. M. Morgan, democrat. Several filed for the office of justice of the peace for the various districts. E. S. Skillings, incumbent republican and Miles H. G. Otis, democrat for the Glendale district; Gerald O. Kabler, Harry Smith and Ward C. Watson, incumbent, all republicans of the Calapooia district. Clarence Leonard, incumbent, Drain district, Fred M. Wright, incumbent and D. O. Hall, republicans of the Reedsport district. The above list includes the principal candidates for county offices in Douglas county.

## Meeting Called Mch. 17 to Oppose Co. Manager Plan

Setting up an organization to actively oppose the proposals for a county manager for Lane county will take place Friday, March 17, at a public meeting scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in the Circuit Court room of the Lane County Court House.

Decision to establish a new working organization was reached at a meeting held in Eugene Friday night which was called by Edwin McCormack who headed the opposition to the county manager plan two years ago. Attending the gathering were Harry Bower, Tom Swartz, Herman Hendershott, Ed Boehnke, Lewis Hoffman, Frank Reid, Paul Plank, C. L. McKinley and representatives of two of Eugene's radio stations.

McCormack, who presided over the meeting, reviewed the work to two years ago that resulted in the defeat of the manager proposal by Lane County's voters and called attention to the many instances in which former supporters of the manager plan have become active opponents of the proposal.

Following decision to call the meeting for next Friday, the group discussed the need for adequate publicity and for speakers to meet with granges, service clubs and other organizations.
