Application for Veterans Tax Exemption Must Be in Assessor's Office April 11

Disabled veterans and veterans' widows entitled to a \$1,000 property tax exemption must apply at their county assessor's office by April 1, 1950 to receive the exemption for the coming fiscal year, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week. The exemption is available to any Oregon resident who meets one of the following conditions.

1. He is an honorably discharged union veteran of the Mexican war and is certified by the Veterans Administration as having a disability of 40 per cent or more, regardless of the amount of compensation or pension he receives.

3. He is an honorably discharged war veteran with a disability of 40 per cent or more which has been certified by a licensed Oregon physician but not by the VA, provided he has not received more than \$2,000 in the past calendar year as pension or retirement pay from the government for his military service.

4. She is the unmarried widow of an honorably discharged war veteran.

This benefit must be applied for annually, the state veterans department said. The exemption applies to the taxable value of the real or personal property which the applicant owns or holds under a recorded purchase contract.

County assessors have the necessary claim forms. Veterans claiming on the basis of disability must submit a certified statement on the basis of disability a certified statement from either the VA on their doctor, depending on their category. Those certified by a doctor must also submit a statement of pension or retirement income. Widows must submit evidence of the husband's service and a copy of the death certificate.

Failure to Obey Basic Rule Causes Most Accidents

Drivers who misunderstand or fail to obey three basic rules of the road are responsible for more than half of Oregon's traffic accidents, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry estimated today.

Despite a common belief that traffic laws vary widely from state to state, these three rules are virtually the same across the nation, the secretary said. He pointed out that violators lucky enough to escape injury may still be liable for damage to others.

He listed the three rules as follows:

The Intersection Rule: If two cars are arriving at an uncontrolled intersection (no stop signs or signals) at about the same time, the car on the right always has the right-of-way. Two out of five Oregon accidents occur at intersections.

The Following Rule: If you run into the rear of another car, you are always at fault. It doesn't matter that the car ahead stopped suddenly or that the driver failed to signal. He may have had no opportunity, and the law requires that you drive far enough behind to be ready for any emergency. After failure to have right-of-way, following too closely is the most frequent single Oregon traffic violation.

The Speed Rule: Speed must be adjusted to conditions regardless of posted or designated speed limits, which are considered maximum for ideal conditions. If traffic is heavy or the roadway is slippery, you may be charged with driving too fast for conditions even though you did not exceed the apparent legal limit. On rural highways without posted speeds, the "reasonable and prudent" rule still applies. Excessive speed is responsible for one out of four traffic fatalities in Oregon.

New "G" String Device to Speed Phone Connection

Telephone subscribers may soon be able to talk to a friend across the continent and both parties will be able to see each other, it was announced today by the U. S. Army Signal Corps at the annual convention of the Institute of Radio Engineers in New York City.

The revolutionary transmission line that would make this possible, called the "G-String" by the Signal Corps, was invented by Dr. Georg Goubau of the Signal Corps Engineering Laboratories, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. The line which is simple, highly efficient, and costs little to manufacture, also promises to open up wholly new possibilities in micro waves and home television. It is a single wire with special insulations and funnel shaped terminals which could carry a hundred transmissions simultaneously, as compared to today's coaxial cable which can carry one.

One immediate use of Dr. Goubau's "G-String" may be as an inexpensive means of distributing television programs to city homes on a "wired wireless" basis, at present prohibitively high in cost. It also may be possible to pipe television programs at relatively low cost to areas of the United States now out of television range; for instance, the midwestern farm belts.

Engineers also pointed out, that, though this discovery will be of civilian use, it will be even more important to the armed forces. The Signal Corps said the new transmission line is likely to change many radar techniques and simplify the difficult problem of feeding power to rotating antennas. It will also permit communication never before available.

Roseburg Asks For Wood Waste Survey in Area

Roseburg may possibly be the first Oregon city to have a wood waste utilization survey. The purpose of the survey would be to determine the establishment of industries promoting year-around employment. Federal and state agencies are at present working on an outline for the studies and have been invited to inaugurate their work in Roseburg.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce directors last night extended an invitation to the state forest products laboratory at Oregon State college and the Bureau of Land Management and Forest Service asking that Roseburg be selected as the place for an initial industrial survey on possible wood waste utilization industries. The action was taken upon recommendation from the chamber membership at its last meeting in February.—Roseburg News Review.

THREE-QUARTER MILLION DPS RESETTLED BY IRO

GENEVA—More than three-quarters of a million refugees and displaced persons have been re-established in new homes or their former countries in two and one-half years of operations by the International Refugee Organization (IRO), a Specialized Agency of the United Nations.

Of the total number, 758,923 were reestablished, 690,145 resettled in new countries and 68,778 returned to their former homelands.

At the end of 1949, a total of 588,768 persons were still receiving IRO help.

As of that date the leading countries of resettlement were: United States, 150,843; Israel, 116,368; Australia, 105,485; United Kingdom, Canada, France, Argentina, and Brazil, in that order.

Seed Growing Lauded as Soil Fertility Aid

"Seed growing has been our most effective tool in stopping soil erosion and in building soil fertility."

That statement was made recently by E. R. Jackman, veteran Oregon State college extension farm crops specialist, before the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency committee meeting at the state house, Salem. He added that seeds occupy a larger percentage of Oregon's cropped area than they do in any other state.

With an annual value of \$20,000,000 this money when divided statistically between 5,000 seed-growers among the state's 35,000 commercial farmers, makes \$4,000 for each.

Jackman is now on sabbatical leave from his duties at O.S.C. and is visiting in South America.

Total seed acreage in the state is now approximately 350,000 acres a year. Thus, with only a little over 3,000,000 acres of cropland and only 2,000,000 acres available for crop changes, seeds are grown each year on one out of every six available acres, Jackman estimates.

By-products received from the seed industry are not figured into the \$20,000,000 figure which refers to the annual value of the seeds alone. In addition to soilholding pastures, Oregon seed fields produce approximately 300,000 tons of feed annually for the state's million head of cattle and almost that many sheep.

Jackman argues that seed farming removes less fertility from the soil than most other types of farming. Although various seed crops vary in the amount of fertility they use, the specialist points out that a good crop of ladino clover cut for seed and the straw used on the land, for example, is equivalent to the application of 1,000 pounds of sulphate of ammonia per acre.

Oregon grows 90 per cent of the nation's ryegrass, bentgrasses, and alta fescue seed; 80 per cent of the seed from fine-leaved fescues; and 75 per cent of the nation's ladino clover seed.

WHO APPOINTS CHIEF FOR NEW YORK OFFICE

LAKE SUCCESS, New York — Dr. P. M. Kaul of India, has been appointed Chief of the New York Liaison Office of the World Health Organization (WHO), one of U. N.'s Specialized Agencies.

Dr. Kaul is a graduate of the medical school of the University of Punjab. He undertook post-graduate studies at Guy's Medical School and Hospital, London, and received his training in public health at the London School of Hygiene.
